This I did not consider strange until I saw the item referred to, where a boast is made of a potato weighing considerably less. In our Province it is not customary to boast, but at the "heel of the hunt" it can favorably compete with any section of the Dominion.

I dare say there are some on the Island even larger than this one, if its possessor only took the trouble to make it known. Meanwhile our "Garden of the Gulf" leads the van in this respect. Hurrah for P. E. Island and its big potatoes!

The Markets.

HALIFAX MARKETS.

We are indebted to James S. Scott's Weekly Market Report, of Wednesday, 1st November, for the following list of prices in Halifax:—

BOSTON MARKETS.

Latest Boston advices state that a large portion of the receipts of potatoes continue to be affected by the rot and buyers are very cautious. For the best Eastern and Northern 65c per bush is the highest we can quote, and some lots run down to 25 to 30 cents.

There continues to be a steady demand for pork, and prices are maintained. The sales have been at \$21 to \$21.50 for extra prime; \$22.50 to \$22.75 for mess; \$29 to \$29.50 for Boston clear, and \$30 per bbl. for backs.

There have been further sales of Lard at 13 1/2 to 14c per lb., with demand about equal to the supply.

Prices of Smoked Hams are steady, with a fair demand.

There is no further particular animation in the Fish market, owing partly to the very unfavorable weather, and prices are without change. At the outports, Mackerel are quoted higher on account of the small receipts, but dealers here are not disposed to pay any advance. The Mackerel fleet have not been able to do anything, owing to the prevalence of east winds and fog, and on Tuesday 150 sail were in Provincetown harbor, with 11,280 lbs. of mackerel, all told. If the weather does not soon clear up the vessels will quit work for the winter. Last fare sale of Mackerel at Gloucester is reported at \$10.02 1/2 per bbl, without barrel. One cargo in Portland sold at \$8.50, \$11.50 and \$15 per bbl. for inspected 3's, 2's, and 1's, respectively. No cargo sales here since last week, and the nominal rate is still \$8. \$11 and \$14 per bbl. Separate Shore 3's are firm at \$8.50 per bbl. The steamer Carroll from P. E. Island on Monday brought 800 bbls. Mackerel, and two other cargoes arrived, making the total receipts from Provincetown the past two days 1,500 bbls. Sales of Island Mackerel have been made at \$8.50, \$11.50, and \$12.50 per bbl, but the demand is not urgent, and no advance can be obtained.

BRITISH MARKETS.

A leading weekly grain circular (dated October 27th) says:—Grain has been quiet. The spot markets were dull and inactive, and generally 6d to 1s lower. Cargoes in all positions met with little inquiry and lower. Flour in sack was slow of sale. For flour in barrel there was a fair inquiry at unchanged rates.

According to the Bulletin des Halles, the harvest in France this year amounts to 112,400,000 hectolitres, or 9,000,000 hectolitres above that of an average year.

According to reports just issued by the Department of Agriculture, at St. Petersburg, the crops of cereals in European Russia this year have been exceedingly good, and generally above the average.

This, doubtless, accounts in great part for the lowness of prices in Great Britain.

Cable advices from England report a decline of 3d. to 6d. per cwt. in West India sugar.
