# MacDonald Rink Wins PEI Consols Curling Ch'ship

The Dr. Wendall MacDonald rink won the Provincial Curling Championship and the British Consols Trophy at the Montague rink yesterday afternoon by defeating the Horace MacFarlane rink from Summerside 11-8 in a thrilling finish.

The members of the island Championship team are Dr. MacDonald, skip; Johnny Squarebriggs, mate; Andy Likey, second stone; and Elmer MacDonald, lead. The team which captured the provincial championship last year, marks the third year in succession for Dr. MacDonald to lead his team to the island championship and represent the Province at the British Consols playdowns which will take place at Moncton, New Brunswick. Andy Likey has been with the team for the past two years having replaced Barry MacDonald who was then in school boy curling.

The MacDonald rink made their victory with three straight wins, defeating the R.C.A.F. team skipped by F.L. Padraic Hugh Christmas

16-8 Wednesday morning, and the MacDonald foursome 16-6 Wednesday afternoon, thus drawing the bye for the third round.

around it. When the Summerside stones were out of the tee near the end, Charlottetown was laying two on the red, and Dr. MacDonald called for his mate, Johnny Squarebriggs, to knock off the pointer to open the tee figuring that he could continue to knock out the Summerside stones as they came in the tee and thus win the end.

More drivers would take loving care of their batteries, we think, if they realized what a safety device the battery can be, as well as the reservoir for the car's electrical system.

When your car has stalled in a tight spot you can move it by turning over the engine with the starter motor and slowly slipping into gear. It's not the best thing for the battery, but it can save your life.

Besides this stand-by emergency role, what a job the battery has to shoulder! The average car today has 20 light bulbs, some models have as many as 38, to say nothing of those power-eaters, the radio, horn and starter.

Looking after your battery is a simple matter of remembering, and it can double your battery's life. Usually, water needs to be added about once a month, but if the battery needs water too often, then charging is too high. If it's only one cell that constantly needs extra water, a leak is the problem.

It's usually pretty obvious why a battery runs down; you've been driving only at night, or using the radio and heater too much. But it can come from hidden things, too, like forgetting to use a light enough oil to ease the load in winter starting.

# MacLeod, Dowling Lead Montague To 5-4 Victory

The free-wheeling Montague Primroses fired home 3 big goals in the last ten minutes of play to shade the Basillea Youth Club 5-4 at the Sports Arena last night in their final encounter in the Island League.

B.Y.C.'s pressing tactics backfired after Dave MacLeod had brought the score to 4-3 at 10:30 of the third period and Buddy Dowling and MacLeod both got breakaways to sail right in on goaltender John Gehrke to score and give Montague their first win of the year over the B.Y.C.

MacLeod and coach Dowling took care of all the scoring for the Primroses with MacLeod hitting for 3 and Dowling picking up the other 2.
