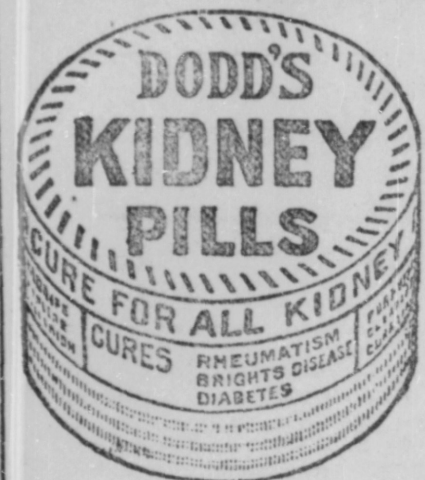

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

TUESDAY, MAY 9.

At the afternoon session, Mr. De-Roches said it was well that the people were intelligent so that they could pass judgment upon the act of the Government. By the legislation of the last few years the Liberals have done more to drive the people away from home than anything that could possibly be done by their opponents. First they disfranchised the young men, and then seeing the effect of their work they repealed it. They compelled people to vote as they dictated in order that they might retain power. He failed to see where the present Government had done anything except to waste the public money. By the Public Accounts it will be seen that Prince County pays her proportion of the taxes, yet nearly all the revenue is spent in Queen's County. The representatives in the Government from Prince County do not see that that county gets a fair share of the disbursements. On roads Prince County is a way down, and the same is true of ferries. Prince County does not get fair treatment. The wharves there are going to destruction. In 1897 there was an election in that county and there was a political job given on Grand River bridge. Some \$1300 was spent when half the money ought to be sufficient. The most particular part of the bridge was neglected and at the first storm it was swept away. This fall another contract was given which necessitated an expenditure of \$1480 owing to the former waste of money. The money in the first instance was not spent as it should have been. He protested strongly against such a system. It is no wonder we have deficits. If this policy is continued we shall soon have neither money nor credit. A wharf was built on the same river some four or five years ago. But it was not put in the right place and was never used; consequently it fell into decay. This is another way the public money is wasted. Another wharf there was allowed to decay for want of repair. It is high time the Government should know these facts and apply the remedy.

Mr. M. McKinnon expected in the budget speech a true report of the financial state of the Province. The Premier said the people were intelligent. But will they be satisfied with the information given in the budget? This is no time to make up the estimates for nearly half the year is gone. The legislature is too late in the season and it is therefore impossible to fully discuss public affairs. The calling of the House is a mere matter of form and legislation is rushed through before it is half considered. A bill is now before the House providing for the appointment of a cheese inspector or instructor. But this official should be at work now as the factories are in operation. Again a Road Act was promised. But where is it? It is too late to be of any benefit this season. The Leader will have to change this part of the programme if he wishes to retain the confidence of the people.

Mr. McKinnon then took up the financial affairs of the Province. According to the public accounts, the debt is \$496,000. Much might be added to this such as the amount due teachers, and the balance is carried over from last year. But he did not desire to swell the debt. He believed it would be about half a million. This is not very great as compared with the debt of the other provinces; but we must remember that they have large natural resources, while we have not. Compared with a few years ago, our state is truly alarming. In 1890 our debt was \$128,429.21; today it is \$446,938.27; in 1890 we owed \$1.17 per capita, today we owe \$4.25; in 1890 our debt per family was \$5.85; today it is \$21.25; in 1890 we paid \$2,967.44 interest; today we pay \$18,552.80. Out of every \$100 revenue collected in 1890 we paid \$1.20 interest, out of every \$100 collected today we pay \$7.12. It is only a matter of time before all our revenues go to pay the debt. The Leader says he will make our children's children pay the debt. He is in a fair way of doing this, and making their children's children pay the balance.

A good deal has been said about making revenue and expenditure meet. Last year a small deficit was promised, and we had a big one. The Leader of the Government talks about the farmers, but what has the Government done for the farmers outside of appointing a cheese inspector? Much is said about Professor Robertson, but that gentleman visited this province before the present Government came into power. It was part of his duty to come, and the Government deserved no credit. Last year there was \$2,000 in the estimates for a department of agriculture, but only \$450 of the amount was spent because there was no head appointed. If a saving could be effected in other departments it might be advisable to top off all the heads.

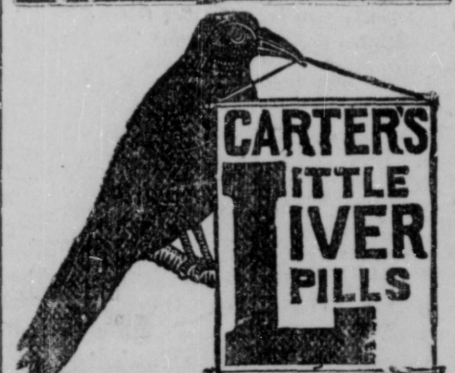
Mr. McKinnon denied that the Government spent \$1,900 yearly on education. That sum was charged to education but it did not belong to that department. They withheld part of their report for a purpose and the true state of education was not therefore apparent. The names of all who receive licences are not in the report simply because licences were granted to persons who were not entitled to them. This matter was brought before the teachers' convention, and it was not denied by the Superintendent of Education.

Mr. McKinnon then dealt with the roads and bridges. It seemed to him that these were to be let go this year. The estimates for right of way were too large. He considered that \$100 was enough for a mile of road. There are quite enough roads, if they are kept in repair.
Mr. Arsenault thought that the expen-

ditures on the roads were not properly made by the supervisors. The mill road near Wellington was in a bad state. The supervisor recommended the opening of \$8, and \$3 was spent. But the work could have been done for 50 cents. He did not find fault with the supervisor, who had been induced not to spend the money where it was most needed. In Edmond Bay \$12 was asked for a road and \$8 was spent for opening drains. In the fall the road was almost impassible in several places. Yet there is no mention of these bad places having been repaired. The people probably repaired them at their own expense.

On the Wellington road the work was done by road machines. But it was spoiled by the first rain. If the work had been let by public sale and performed by hand the road would have been in better shape and the \$20 would have been well expended. Mr. Arsenault instanced several other roads in his district that were not what they should be and held that the money voted was not judiciously expended. The Government are placing themselves in a very bad light with the people and should try to effect a remedy.
