New Type Plane At S'side Station

A new type of aircraft, Beechcraft Expeditor, that have been specially modified for navigation training, have made their appearance on the Summerside R. C. A. F. Station. These twin engine, twin tail planes are smaller, slightly faster and more economical to operate, because they burn less gas, than the Dakota aircraft which have in the past been employed in the earlier stages of basic training.

These new aircraft, which are built in Wichita, Kansas, by the Beechcraft Company, are being used to supplement basic flying in the training program at the Summerside air station. In view of the increased training program expected to take place at the Summerside station, they will fit in nicely with the Dakota aircraft in use. Being small aircraft and using less gas they can be used for shorter flight runs and leave the Dakotas free for long range flights, thus making more training possible. Since this station trains their own pilots on instrument ratings, it is expected that these new aircraft will be very convenient for practical work in instrument training.

Summerside Sisters Join Air Force



Only Few Chosen From Many Work Applicants

Many Prince County workers who journeyed to Summerside yesterday at their own expense through the mud, had their high hopes of employment by an interviewer for an American construction firm in Labrador, sadly dashed when they arrived and discovered that only a handful of men were wanted, and many of these were required to be tradesmen with considerable experience.

Some time ago it was reported that the requirements for Labrador work would be more than 1,000 men, but it would now appear that previous information regarding the number of Island applicants required for work on this Labrador project was misleading.

Out of approximately 60 applicants interviewed yesterday by the company's representative at the Summerside office of the National Employment Service, only five or six were approved for employment; and they must yet pass a physical examination before final acceptance.

It was reported that the required standard of skilled workmen and tradesmen was set so high that it almost automatically disqualified most applicants. It was reported that a welder with eleven years experience, five years of which had been served in the Halifax ship yards, was rejected on the grounds of insufficient experience.

A truck driver with over three years experience driving the standard heavy trucks used on P.E.I. reported he was rejected because more experience was required and that that experience had to be with trucks of a heavier tonnage than is normally used on Island highways.

Officials at the Unemployment Office of Charlottetown, who were queried by a Guardian representative concerning this unfortunate situation of having called in so many men over such bad roads on what for the vast majority, was a "wildgoose chase", claimed the unemployment office had acted in good faith, and had not had any indication from the company that might cause them to believe anything other than the preliminary announced number of applicants that would be required for work in Labrador.

Last fall a somewhat similar experience occurred when a firm had the Unemployment Office call in a large number of men for interview, and on the morning of the day the men had made the trip called to say he could not then visit Summerside.

Boston Bruins have just handed coach Lynn Patrick three victories in a row over Montreal Canadiens, romping to a 3-2 lead in games in the best-of-seven series. And the next game is on Boston ice Sunday.

But there was coach Patrick, sitting alone in a hotel lobby. He was the saddest-looking winning coach imaginable.

"I'm sweating out Sunday's game," said Patrick mournfully. He looked it.

Up at the Montreal Forum where his team lost a 1-0 heartbreaker last night, coach Dick Irvin actually allowed a few smiles to flit across his face.

Irvin is known throughout the National Hockey League for his chronic dolefulness and tactfulness. "The team that beats us Sunday," proclaimed Irvin, "has never been played in the National Hockey League."

At the Provincial ladies curling playdowns held in Summerside last month, a rink skipped by Betty Linkletter with the following personnel, Mrs. Irene Silliphant, Miss Sally Basler and Mrs. Frances Henthorn scored a perfect end against one of the opponents.

Let's Talk It Over

In a matter of weeks the streets of our towns and villages and the open highways will be ready for more or less normal driving again. The speeds at which cars will travel will be stepped-up accordingly, and the chances of fatal highway accidents will increase. It is the time for us all to make a fresh resolve that we will make caution our watchword every minute we sit behind the wheel, and the possibility of such tragedy and heartbreak resulting from the slightest relaxation of our vigilance.

In the case of little children, with their unexpected, impulsive actions so liable to put them in peril, it is up to car drivers to exercise extra-special care. It is possible one might be involved in an accident causing the death of a child, and a jury might exonerate him from all blame, but deep down in his heart might persist a gnawing realization that the accident might have been averted if he had exercised just a little more care.

One driver has said that when he passes a parked car, he always assumes a child is playing behind it, and drives accordingly. It is difficult to make small children realize the danger of suddenly running out from behind parked cars. Thoughtlessness is natural to those little tots. It is up to us to make up for their lack of wisdom and care by adding a little extra caution on our part. Doubtless, even with this extra care, such accidents will happen, but if such tragedies could be materially reduced, wouldn't it be worth the extra effort?
