

# Dodgers Take Over First; Pirates Slip into Third

HOUSTON (AP) — Lou Johnson, Ron Fairly and Jim Lefebvre each drove in three runs Sunday as Los Angeles Dodgers clobbered Houston 14-3 and moved into first place in the National League by one percentage point.

The victory, the third straight, boosted the Dodgers ahead of Pittsburgh Pirates, who lost to Cincinnati 9-7. Third-place San Francisco is three points out.

The Astros' loss was their eighth straight, 15th in the last 16 games and 21st in the last 25.

Johnson hit a two-run homer in the Dodgers' three-run first inning and singled across a run in a five-run eighth.

Fairly, who had four hits altogether, also hit a two-run homer, in the fourth, and brought in an eight-inning run with a single. Lefebvre knocked in one run with a seventh-inning grounder and two more with a triple in the eighth.

Willie Davis collected four hits for the Dodgers while John Roseboro added three to the 20-hit assault.

Cloninger earned his 10th win against seven losses as he fanned six in outlasting the Phillies' Larry Jackson.

Rico Carty started the scoring in the second with his sixth home run. In the sixth, Felipe Alou singled with two out and rode home on Joe Torre's double, and in the seventh Woody Woodward doubled for his third hit and scored as Cloninger doubled to the wall in centre.

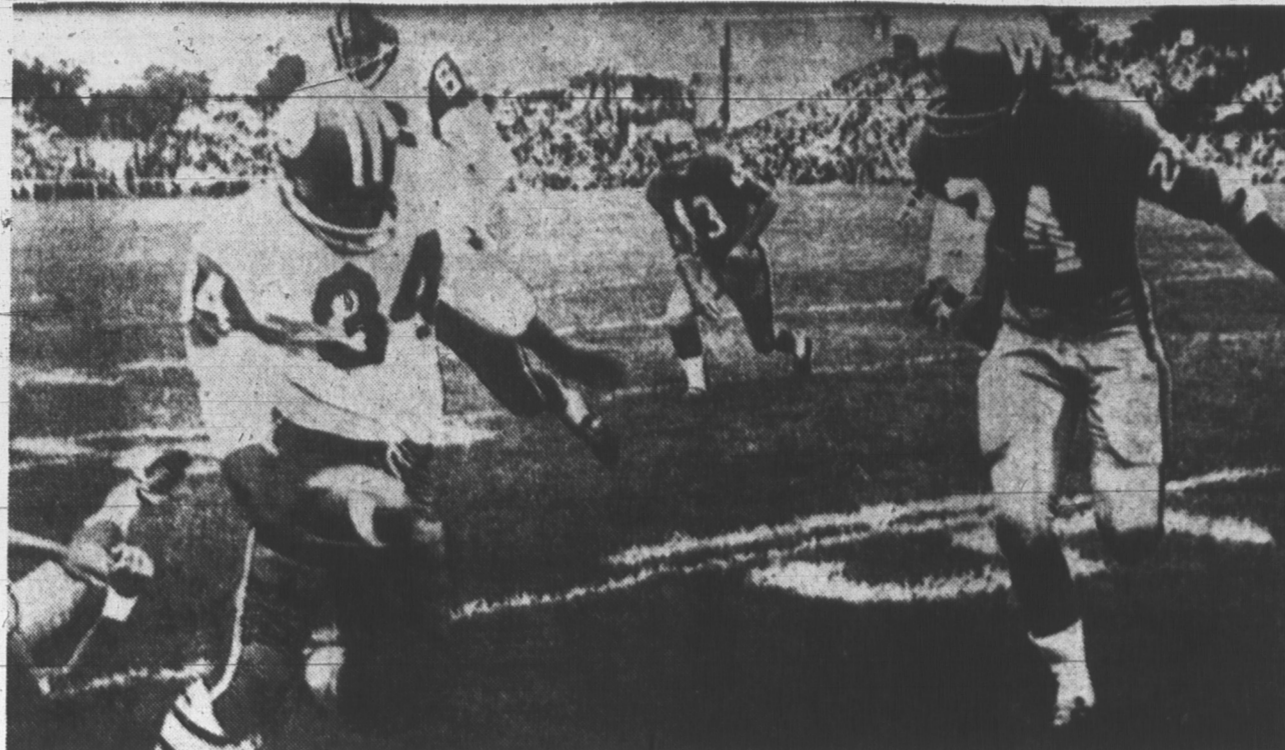
WASHINGTON (AP) — Ken McMullen's three-run homer in the sixth inning climaxed a four-run outburst against John Miller and helped Washington Senators defeat American League leading Baltimore Orioles 6-2 Sunday.

Pete Richert gave up nine hits, but the Orioles scored only on home runs by Brooks Robinson and Paul Blair. It was Robinson's 20th of the season and Blair's fourth.

Miller breezed through the first four innings, giving up only a single by Ken Harrison in the second, and fanning six.

But Paul Casanova led off the fifth with his ninth homer, and with one out, Brinkman and Bob Saverine singled, McMullen followed with his 10th home run.

The Senators added a run in the seventh on Saverine's single.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Deron Johnson lashed two doubles and a single, driving in four runs Sunday as Cincinnati defeated Pittsburgh 9-7 despite a lousy hitting performance by Roberto Clemente.

Clemente smashed two homers and two singles and knocked in five runs. His three-run homer in the seventh inning cut the Reds' lead to two runs, but the Pirates couldn't get any closer.

Johnson's second double drove in three runs in the sixth, boosting the Reds' margin to 9-4. The hit, off Don Cardwell, came after Cincinnati loaded the bases on singles by Don Nootbar and Tommy Harper and a walk to Tommy Helms.

Johnson also doubled home a run and scored on Dick Simpson's single in a three-run fifth, and he triggered a three-run fourth with a single.

CHICAGO (AP) — Cap Peterson's two-run single capped a four-run seventh inning that helped San Francisco snap a three-game losing streak Sunday with a 9-6 victory over Chicago Cubs.

Willie McCovey and Jim Hart drove in runs with doubles in the seventh and Peterson followed with his two-run single, which proved the winning blow as the Cubs came back in the bottom of the seventh with two runs on a double by Randy Hundley.

Hundley started the scoring in the second, when he hit his 13th homer following a single by Ron Santo. Mays then put the Giants ahead with a three-run homer in the third. It was his 25th of the year and the 530th of his career.

DETROIT (AP) — Joe Foy's leadoff homer in the 10th inning gave Boston Red Sox a 7-6 victory over Detroit Tigers and a split of an American League doubleheader Sunday. The Tigers won the first game 9-2.

Foy was the first batter to face Detroit reliever Orlando Pena. The homer was his 13th.

The Tigers went ahead 6-4 with a six-run seventh inning in which Willie Horton led off with his second homer of the day and later hit a two-run single.

But Carl Yastrzemski hit a two-run pinch homer in the top of the ninth, tying the game.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Tony Cloninger pitched a five-hit shut-out Sunday and doubled home a run as Atlanta Braves defeated Philadelphia Phillies 3-0.

ANAHEIM (AP) — Wayne Causey tripled home two runs and scored another, powering a four-run rally in the 10th inning that gave Chicago White Sox a 9-8 victory over California Sunday.

Pitcher Bobby Locker started the 10th with an infield single. But Jack Sanford retired the next two batters, Jerry Adair then singled, and Causey followed with a triple to right-center field for two runs, that broke a 5-5 tie.

Bill Skowron singled in Causey and came around himself on a double by Don Buford.

The Mets scored two runs each in the first and seventh innings of the nightcap.

The two in the first came on singles by Ed Bressoud, Ken Boyer, Swoboda, and Bill Murphy.

Then in the seventh Ron Hunt doubled, Boyer was walked intentionally and Swoboda singled Hunt home. Larry Elliot then grounded to pitcher Al Jackson who threw the ball into center field on an attempted force play at second. Boyer raced home on the error.

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Dick Green singled in two runs in a three-run fourth inning that propelled Kansas City past Minnesota Twins 4-2 and helped the Athletics gain a split of a Sunday American League doubleheader.

The Twins won the first game 2-1 on a pair of run scoring singles by Don Mincher. Jim Gosger singled in the Kansas City fourth in the nightcap, went to second on a single by Danny Cater and scored on Roger Repou's double. Green's single brought in Cater and Repou.

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# Jerome Takes BEG's 100; Swimmers Also Winning

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)—In a little more than nine seconds Saturday night Harry Jerome of Vancouver swept aside seven years of frustrating failure in big-time track competition when he won the gold medal in the men's 100-yard dash, one of the plums of the British Empire Games.

It was Canada's first gold medal in the short sprint since Percy Williams of Vancouver sped to victory in the first Games at Hamilton, Ont., in 1896.

Jerome's photo-finish victory—10.7 seconds—was the closest in the history of the event. He beat the silver medalist, Dave Ellis of Toronto, by a hair's breadth.

The old Games record of 10.7 seconds was set by Bruce Kidd of Toronto, the winner in 1962.

England was the day's biggest gold medal winner with five. The English team began with the 20-mile walk at the crack of dawn and Bolton composer Ron Walkwork scored an easy victory over 11 rivals in two hours, 44 minutes, 42 seconds.

Alex Oakley of Oshawa, Ont., was fifth and Felix Cappella of Midland, Ont., sixth.

Walkwork, who arrived at the finish 10 pounds lighter, was followed home by a man who

spends almost every day of his life walking—London postman Ray Middleton.

The English girls had an excellent day, winning swimming, diving and fencing gold medals.

Jill Slattery, 21-year-old Sheffield hairdresser, scraped home by a touch to win the 220-yard breaststroke final from her great rival and teammate, Stella Mitchell, a London typist.

Both women were clocked in 2:50.3. Donna Ross of Montreal was eighth and last.

Only a few minutes previously, another London typist, Kathy Rowlatt, had easily clinched the springboard diving title, in which she led all the way. She scored a total of 735.00 points. Miss Boys, the freckled-faced baby of the Canadian team, fought off a last-ditch challenge from Susan Knight, the Aussie defending champion, to win the silver with 624.50 points to 624.50 for Miss Knight.

A tremendous last dive—a forward twist—somersault with double twist—turned the trick for the Canadian girl and brought her 80.40 points, just enough to win.

John Fitzsimons, a 23-year-old Abingdon (Berkshire) teacher, gained England's fifth gold of the day by winning the men's javelin with a toss of 261 feet, nine inches, wiping out the old Games record of 256-3 set by Australia's Alf Mitchell in 1962.

Canada's swimming gold medals Saturday were won by Marion Lay of Vancouver in the women's 110-yard freestyle and Ron Jacks, a native of Winnipeg, who lives in Vancouver, in the men's 110-yard butterfly.

Beverly Boys, a Toronto-district youngster, contributed a silver medal for second place in the women's springboard diving.

The Canadians now are credited with 10 medals in the 20 championships decided Friday and Saturday and there still is a week left in the schedule. At this rate, the Canadian medal harvest could prove to be one of the best of the post-war games.

Canada's post-war peak came in 1954 at Vancouver when 43 medals, including nine gold, were won.

Here, the Canadian total of four gold, two silver and four bronze medals ranks second only to the 16 won by England, including seven gold, Australia, with 12 medals, has one gold less than Canada.

One world record in swimming—and eight Games records—were broken Saturday and two Games records were equalled.

Today, Jerome will begin his quest to become the first Canadian to win a Games gold double in the sprints when he enters the 220-yard eliminations.

While Jerome's triumph had been expected after his form in the heats, another well-known star, Ron Clarke of Australia, was beaten by an unknown Kenya army private in the six-mile run.

It was an outstanding upset since Clarke is the world re-

cord-holder at the distance and considered the best of the long-distance runners.

The Kenya who captured the hearts of everyone here is Nafali Temu, a 23-year-old tribesman. He beat Clarke by more than 150 yards and set a Games record of 27 minutes, 14.6 seconds.

Over the final mile, he left an athen-fleeced Clarke struggling farther and farther behind, and he sprinted down the finishing straight as if he were finishing a 440-yard race instead of a gruelling 24 laps in hot, steamy heat.

Clarke was second in 27:39.4 for the silver and Scotland's Jim Adler took the bronze in 28:15.4. Dave Ellis of Toronto was sixth and Andy Boychuk of Orono, Ont., eighth.

The old Games record of 28:26.6 was set by Bruce Kidd of Toronto, the winner in 1962.

# London Is "Clay Pigeon" Battered To Floor In 3rd

LONDON (CP)—Cassius Clay casually flattened British heavyweight Brian London Saturday night in a three-round fight that British sports writers termed a farce and a fiasco.

London crumpled under a dazzling flurry of punches from the champion at one minute, 40 seconds of the third round, without ever giving Clay trouble.

Clay, who defends his heavyweight crown again against West German Karl Mildenberger Sept. 10, said: "I expected it to be fast, but it was quicker than I thought."

London said he was disgusted with himself.

"I am sorry," he told reporters. "You told me he was good, but nobody said, he was that good."

"It was not a question of luck. I just was not good enough. There were so many punches I didn't know where they were coming from."

London, at 205 1/2 pounds, lumbered in, trying to trap Clay against the ropes. But the champion could get free at will.

Clay stepped up his attack late in the second round and early in the third, caught London in his own corner, unleashing a dozen lightning punches that ended with a right.

None looked like a knock-out blow but their speed, timing and accuracy were perfect and deadly. London dropped like a stone, rolled over and stayed.

Clay, who was heavier than usual at 209 1/2 pounds, was fast, dancing around the challenger and getting the best of every exchange.
