New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—Rumors were a dime a dozen last week in Wall street, and the stock market seemed to listen to all of them as it advanced to a record high mark.

The most popular split rumor concerned Chrysler. Officials said they hadn't heard the reports. Nevertheless the stock gained 9 3/4% at 99% on the week as Chrysler introduced its 1956 models.

Sears Roebuck directors came through with an official proposal for a three-for-one split of its common stock plus a better dividend. It gained 7% on the week to close at 115 1/2.

Reports of possible dividend increases and estimates of higher earnings had firmer foundations. As a matter of fact, business last week was good and is expected to get better.

As measured by the Associated Press average of 60 stocks, the market reached a new record high mark of \$181.30, up 90 cents on the week. The average now has concluded five straight weekly advances.

The five most active issues on the New York stock exchange were Chrysler up 9 3/4% at 99% on 103,100 shares, U. S. Steel up 2 1/2% at \$22, Phillips Petroleum up 3 3/4% at 79 1/2, Columbia Gas up 3 1/2% at 16 1/2, and General Motors up 3 1/2% at 143 1/2.

Among Canadian issues on the New York exchange, Dome Mines lost 1/2% over the week and closed at 15 1/2. International Nickel was 3 1/2% lower at 84 1/2, Canadian Pacific finished unchanged from the previous week at 34 1/2 and Distillers Seagrams gained five to 49.

On the American exchange, Giant Yellowknife added 1-16 to 6-3/16 and Royalite lost 1/2 to 15 1/2.

U. S. STEEL

CLEVELAND (AP)—Greater steel production capacity and reduction in demand from the automobile industry will make steel a little easier to get next year, Steel magazine predicts.

An industry spokesman estimates a cut of 6.5 to 13 per cent in 1956 auto production would leave about 1,800,000 tons of finished steel to other consumers, or enough to supply the agricultural implement business for a year.

Steel mills continue to push hard to fill the orders on their books. Production last week climbed half a point to 96 per cent of rated capacity. It was the fourth consecutive week of increased output.

Steel predicts that aluminum production capacity will more than double in the United States in the next 20 years.

The metalworking weekly says the Ohio river valley may become the leading single aluminum producing district in the country, second only to Canada's Kitimat district.

The product's price composition on finished steel and steelmaking scrap were unchanged.

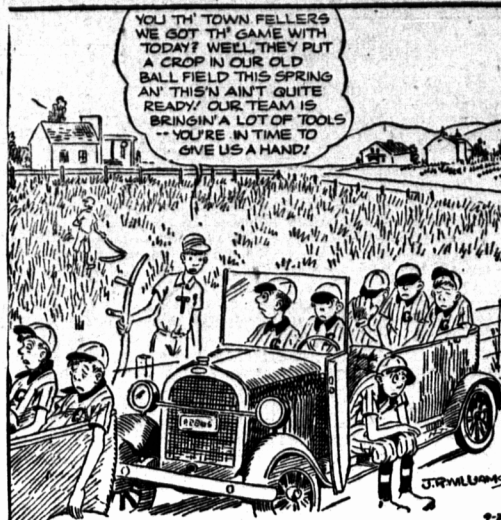

BORN THIRTY YEARS TOO SOON

Warns Against Chronic Fluorosis in Dairy Herds

SASKATOON (CP)—A word of caution for farmers who believe a little extra mineral is beneficial to cattle was sounded here by Dr. D. G. Dale of Macdonald College, Montreal.

He said the animals can get extra fluorine with the extra mineral, and this could bring the fluorine intake near the danger point.

Dr. Dale, sounding the warning note during the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association meeting here, said several Quebec and Ontario dairy herds were found last year to be suffering from chronic fluorosis.

Following this discovery, changes were made in the Feeding Stuffs Act designed to eliminate the hazard in future. But, said Dr. Dale, government regulations can not cover all circumstances.

The Feeding Stuffs Act was amended in 1954 to limit the amount of fluorine that can be present in feeding stuffs sold in Canada for cattle, sheep, swine and poultry. Protein and mineral supplements also were covered as far as cattle were concerned.

In dairy cattle, it had been established that dental fluorosis could be produced when the intake was as low as one milligram of fluorine per kilogram of feed a day. It was felt that economic damage did not occur until the intake approached two milligrams per kilogram a day.

The majority of the dealing trade, it is claimed, now operates at a gross margin of below the traditional 10 per cent. The average is said to be 7 1/2 or 8 per cent, and some of the small dealers work for as low as 6 per cent.

One of the outstanding dealers who is in a financial position to sell his goods at what he considers a fair mark-up reports that his gross profit will not reach 10 per cent this season. Dealers contend that what has been happening in terms of supply of merchandise is this: Low end and moderate priced skins were the first to be gobbled up by the manufacturers. Supplies of such pelts are now extremely scarce. Consequently, in order to obtain skins to feed production lines, makers have been forced to purchase better skins which are, of course, higher priced. The bulk of the stocks still in dealers' hands at present is better merchandise.

Among the furs offered to be at the general auction of the Hudson's Bay Company, London, October 3rd, we notice muskrat 225,000, black muskrat 6,000, southern muskrat 70,000, marten 2,000, white fox 2,000, fisher 150, wild mink 1,500, ranch mink 4,000, raccoon 3,000, silver fox 5,000, blue fox 3,500, platina fox 750 and large quantities of other furs.

The claim of sharply increased mink skin prices, dealers contend, will not stand up. It is an illusion caused by the continuing shift of better and still better quality pelts brought on by the rapid dissipation of cheaper merchandise. In general, dealers view the mink market as very firm to only slightly.

Timely Notes On Fur Farming

Where sold, dressed silverbush and ranch mink continued to command prices fully firm to June levels as New York Auction concluded and end of the season sale last week. Some 4,500 silverbush were reported 85 per cent sold and most of the 7,500 ranch mink was reported 50 per cent sold. The offerings were mostly odds and ends accumulated from the local trade. The fur trapping season in California gets under way November 15 and extends to February 28, 1956. Major furs there are muskrat, mink, beaver, raccoon, coyote and bobcat. River otters have become very scarce in recent years and marten still scarcer. Trapping of them is not permitted and has not been for several years.

Sam Gottesfeld writing in Women's Wear Daily, states: Manufacturers should be doubly cautious about purchasing mink skins at present because of short supply the way for "profitizing." This is the view of manufacturing sources here who are fearful that reckless price hikes at the skin and wholesale levels or both can react to the detriment of mink business at retail. Dealers' stocks of ranch and mutation mink are now substantially below the levels of a year ago. Typically, one of the biggest dealers in the trade reports his inventory currently one-third less than last year at this time. Some of the smaller dealers are virtually cleaned out of merchandise.

In spite of currently sluggish turnover of merchandise at the dealer level, it appears likely that the emink-trade will face the 1955 auction season, opening in December with the smallest carry-over of merchandise on record. This, some manufacturers believe, increases the opportunity for price rises and profiteering at the dealer level. Some, in fact, claim they have already been asked to pay substantially higher prices for skins in short supply than they paid a few months ago. To this charge, the dealers reply that the sharply competitive nature of the mink and all dealing business makes the charge of "profitizing" merely a figment of the manufacturers' imaginations.
