intended to comment on "the horrible inefficiency" of the service in Charlottetown. He stated that at a previous hearing they had been told that dial service would come in with higher rates and now higher rates were being asked "with nothing but promises" of a dial system. He asked why the public should be asked to pay more for an admittedly inadequate service.

In stating that a company like this should have a logical outlook on expansion he held that they could not have been forward looking at all. In support of the dial system he cited the service during the war years and maintained that expansion of traffic should have been foreseen. He objected to the various "Groups" to be established in this Province and said the rates were higher than in Nova Scotia. He said, however, that though the company should not be punished for its lack of foresight, it should not be encouraged to do so again.

At one stage during the hearing yesterday he and Mr. Mathieson engaged in a verbal exchange over the manner in which witnesses had been cross examined by Mr. Martin at the hearing before.

Mr. Bruce Judson in appearing for the connecting lines said that the Island Telephone Company was not the only one to suffer storm damage. There was considerable damage in the country and perhaps it was because equipment was not substantial enough to withstand storm onslaughts. Judge Trainor said that this was true all over Canada and elsewhere as there were continual reports of severe storm damage.

No Agreement Mr. Judson raised the point of no agreement between companies for use of lines and equipment on toll calls where one company received all the financial return. The Commission chairman suggested that this point would be better raised through a special application to the Commission for such an agreement between companies rather than at a rate hearing.

Mr. Brennan mentioned to Mr. Mathieson complaints received by the Commission regarding the type of pay telephones in use in Summerside. He said they resulted in a lot of confusion because they were not the same type as in general use across Canada.

During the morning session Mr. A. Walthen Gaudet, on behalf of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, said that the attitude of the company towards the rate increase "strikes us as being reasonably fair." He, too, admitted that the telephone service was far from being satisfactory, but said that company officials had admitted it. If it was improved in the service there must be expansion by the company "and that takes money."

The hearing was further adjourned to an unnamed date to give the Commission an opportunity of studying the submissions before announcing its decision.

Inquest At Summerside Is Concluded

A coroner's jury empanelled to enquire into the cause of death of Mrs. Jeremiah Doiron, Mrs. Helen Doiron and her son, Marcel Doiron, age 4 years, who died in the Prince County Hospital after the truck in which they were driving was in collision with an east bound train at Traveller's Rest on Dec. 12th, last night heard the balance of the evidence taken by Coroner Dr. Austin Delaney.

After some deliberation the jury brought in the verdict that the victims had died as a result of injuries received when the truck had come in collision with the C.N.R. train and that no blame was attached to the members of the train crew.

The jury recommended that adequate warning signals be placed by the C.N.R. at all highway crossings and that the present whistle now used be replaced by those formerly used by the steam-driven locomotives. The jury further recommended that a provincial law be enacted that all motorists come to a full stop before proceeding over a C.N.R. crossing.

Evidence was taken last night from the two members of the R.C.M.P. who had been called to the scene of the accident, Constables Raymond Stenden and P. M. Grover. It was established by their evidence that there was no liquor in the truck nor any indication whatever that the driver had been drinking.

Tells of Accident Urbain Doiron, the truck driver, said that he and his mother, his wife and two children had left home on December 12th to come to Summerside. When they approached the C.N.R. crossing at Traveller's Rest and were about 15 or 20 yards away his mother had called out that a train was approaching. He said that he immediately applied the brakes but that his truck must have been estimated for he recalled very little after his mother's warning until they were struck. He got out of the truck and saw his mother lying on the ground on the right side of the truck, his wife still in the seat and his son Marcel lying on the ground.

He said that he had not seen any railway signal as he approached the crossing and that it never occurred to him that there was a crossing at this point. He said that he had heard no bell or warning until just after his mother had shouted. The stop draft window on the driver's side of the truck was open.
