

Life Term For U. S. Airman

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP)—The U.S. 2nd Air Force Saturday announced a life sentence against a captain for trying to sell atomic secrets to Russia.

The man was identified as Capt. George H. French, 36, of Mount Vernon, N.Y., a bombardier on a B-36 crew.

The air force said French was stationed at a Caribbean base and was on leave in Washington, D.C., and New York City last April when the offence occurred.

The court martial began Sept. 17, the air force said, and ended late Friday. It was conducted in secret because of the classified nature of evidence.

Describes Conditions Today In Greece, India and Korea

The special speaker at the evening services at Trinity United Church last evening was Dr. Lotta Hitchensmanova, Executive Director of the Unitarian Service Committee of Canada, from Ottawa. The title of her address was "I Was There". She described conditions as she had found them during her latest world survey in Greece, India and Korea, and stressed the improvements which had taken place in the first two and said that the situation in Korea is much more tragic than it was immediately following the end of hostilities. The reasons for this are inflation and the crop failure last autumn.

Dr. Hitchensmanova appealed to her listeners for increased shipments of warm clothing and mentioned the two new projects of her organization — "The Pullover Parade" and "The Layette Project" pledging to the United Nations 25,000 layettes for Arab refugee babies in the Middle East. After the service, Dr. Hitchensmanova showed her latest coloured movie film taken in India and Korea last spring. This film was followed by a question and answer period during which Dr. Hitchensmanova outlined in detail the current U.S.C. programme.

Today will be another busy one for Dr. Hitchensmanova who will have several interviews besides addressing an assembly of students at Queen Charlotte High School this afternoon, and an open meeting at which she will also show her film at Prince of Wales College tonight. This meeting is being sponsored by the Charlottetown Business and Professional Women's Club.

Mr. Bentley addressed those present at the meetings and also announced that the P.E.I. Drama Festival Association recently passed the following resolution:

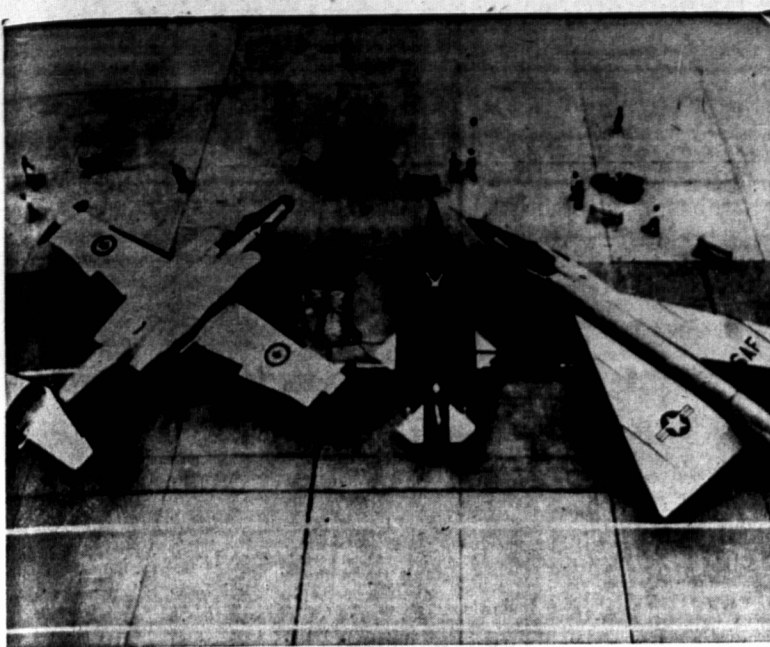
