

Dizzy Dean And Simmons Enter Hall Of Fame

COOPERSTOWN, N. Y., (AP)—Dizzy Dean and Al Simmons, two of baseball's former greats, were inducted formally into the hall of fame Monday when their plaques were dedicated by George Trautman, president of the National Association of Minor League, in ceremonies held in front of the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum.

They were the 63rd and 64th to be so honored.

Dean, colorful, ace of the St. Louis Cardinal gas house gang in the early 1930s, beamed good-will as he took his accustomed place at a microphone to acknowledge the honors.

"It's the greatest honor I ever received," he said in his Texas Arkansas draw. "I want to thank the good Lord for giving me a good right arm, a strong back and a weak mind."

Looking at other hall of fame men sitting on the platform, Ty Cobb, Connie Mack, Cy Young, Ed Walsh and Rogers Hornsby, he said:

"Them's the kind of ball players I'd like to have had behind me all the time."

Then he paid a glowing tribute to his former Cardinal and Chicago Cub mates who "stopped them line drives and got some runs for me."

Simmons, at 245 about 45 pounds over his old playing weight, likewise spoke about "the greatest honor ever paid me" and then turned to heap praise on his old boss, Mr. Mack.

"I want to talk about the first nine years of my big league career," he said. "During those nine years I hit 358. I want to pay my respects to the man who

was responsible for my being here today.

"In the first nine years under Mr. Mack no former player ever calls him Connie I was a great ball player under his guidance. After I left he played with seven clubs in 21 years. I was just another ball player. He was the greatest man I ever met in any life."

Stengel Unhappy With Play Of His Yankees

NEW YORK, (AP)—You would get the impression that manager Casey Stengel wasn't exactly happy with the play of his New York Yankees on their recent road trip.

Said Casey: "The pitching wasn't good." "The hitting was bad." "Our fielding was poor."

The crusty Yankee manager had time to survey the situation Monday, an off day before opening a 14-game home stand.

But Casey, who has no aversion to talking, wasn't saying much of a headline nature.

He flatly declined to say what he's going to do about tightening up his own club. He wouldn't pass judgment on any of the contenders.

"All I know is we went out on the road with a three-team race and we come back with a four-team race," he said.

"Those Red Sox seem to have done better than any of us. Now they're just 7½ behind. They look like they got something going."

The Red Sox, renowned as a home club not dangerous on the road, won 10 and lost two on their western swing.

The Yankees won seven and lost six—just a little better than 500—but clung to a 5½-game lead over Chicago White Sox. The Red Sox are in third place, 7½ back, and Cleveland Indians next, eight away.

Casey acknowledged that the Yankees were lucky not to have lost more ground than they did. The chief challengers failed to take advantage of the champion's slump. The Yankees gained half a game on the White Sox and lost only half a game to the Indians.

But "on the whole, we didn't look good. I don't know what we'll do about it. That's between me and the fellows at the office."
