Attempts on the Lives of Sovereigns.

The Boston Daily Advertiser, referring to the recent attempts to assassinate the Emperor William, says:—

"In the last twenty-five years two attempts have been made to kill the Emperor of Austria, two upon the Emperor of Russia, one upon the Emperor Napoleon, one upon Victor Emmanuel and one upon Queen Victoria, making with these last, nine in all. The first attack upon Francis Joseph, by the Hungarian Libeny, in 1853, was punished with death. Orsini and a companion were also executed for their plot against the French Emperor. But Karakasoff, a Russian socialist, who shot at the Emperor Alexander in 1866, at St. Petersburg, was only exiled, and Berezonski, the Pole, who attempted his life during his visit to Paris in 1867, was not executed, and the person who fired at the Queen of England was only detained as insane."

PERSONAL

Chief Justice Sir William Bragg, of Donarara, is dead.

The average yearly income of a Frenchman is \$80; that of a German only \$65.

Six hundred cabin passengers sailed from New York for Europe on Saturday.

The ladies of the higher class in Spain are fast ceasing to attend the bull fights.

Mr. Hector Cameron, M. P., and family sailed for Europe on Saturday by the Samaritan.

Lieut. Charles H. Cochrane has been appointed Flag-Lieutenant to Vice-Admiral Sir Edward A. Inglefield, Commander-in-Chief on the Halifax station.

It is an astonishing fact that nearly all the English actors who have had their memories buried in biographies are said to have been "born of highly respectable parents in the city of Bath."

Rev. A. Fyfe, D. D., Theological Professor of Woodstock College, who is about to assume the Principalship of the Ottawa Ladies' College, is at present the guest of Hon. Alexander McKenzie at the capital.

Mr. Bryant's having produced what so many consider his masterpiece at the outset of his career recalls similar instances. "Vathek" was written in Beckford's 30th year, "Pickwick" before Dickens was 22, and "Pelham" when Bulwer was of the same age.

The late William Cullen Bryant almost lived out of doors, caring little for the weather, and ready with axe or pruning knife or anything that gave hearty exercise. At 75 he could leap into the air, catch at a bough, and swing himself along by it like a very boy.

The will of William Cullen Bryant was on Saturday placed on probate at Jamaica, L. I. The document is dated December 6th, 1872, and is in Mr. Bryant's own handwriting. Besides his two daughters—one the wife of Parke Goodwin and the other unmarried—only two persons get any portion of the estate, which is estimated at \$350,000.

The Duke of Argyll, is a duke, two marquises, three earls, two viscounts and six barons all rolled into one, hereditary Master of the Queen's Household and Keeper of the Great Seal of Scotland, Admiral of the Western Isles and hereditary Sheriff of Argyllshire. Besides which he is the MacCallum More, as his sires before him have been for 600 years, and his son has married the daughter of a Queen.

The Congressman who is charged with having indecently assaulted a young lady in a restaurant, at Washington, is a Southerner, almost a boy in years. The ex-Confederate who punished him is General Rasser, who, in all probability, will be challenged. The friends of the Congressman in question, whose name is Juken, a representative from South Carolina, publish a card pronouncing the story as of the most unqualified, sensational, and unwarranted character.

The Venerable Archdeacon Row, of Kingston, Jamaica, has taken his co-workers in the church there and some confiding merchants to the extent of \$60,000, selling bills of ex-

change to some of these against funds in England, where he had none. Criminal proceedings are threatened by some of his creditors, and he has now taken up his residence in Madeira, where it is supposed he is beyond the reach of the British law. He still draws \$4,000 per annum as Archdeacon, although he has been absent from the Island two years.

William Cullen Bryant never entertained a very high opinion of Henry Ward Beecher. Even when the latter was at the zenith of his fame and influence, the poet regarded him as a man without positive religious convictions, ever fond of applause and at heart thoroughly selfish. He once remarked to a friend visiting at Roslyn in the summer of 1858, "Mr. Beecher would make a good actor; he is out of place in the pulpit."

"Ion," in Social Notes, writes as follows:—"I chanced not long ago to be taking refreshment at a confectioner's near the Strand. A well-dressed lady entered and took a bun and a glass of sherry. The sherry she drank, the bun she put into her reticule as a thing not wanted. I had time to spare; when she left the shop I followed her; saw her enter another and do the same. A little further on she entered a third, with the same result. She then called a cabriolet and drove home. It is not unlikely that she had taken six glasses of sherry at six different confectioners' counters." Again:—"A gentleman was examining the tradesmen's monthly accounts with a view to payment. On going through that of the grocer he was startled by the amount charged for ten—25 in four weeks—and said there must be some mistake. The grocer at first gave confused answers, but when directly charged with fraud confessed the truth. Four of the items should have been not tea, but sherry. Since that occurrence the husband and wife have lived separate, she is under restraint."

The warm weather is causing the young Colorado beetle to hatch out in the Province of Quebec in enormous numbers.

It is estimated that 20,000 years are required for the deposit of foraminiferous ooze at the bottom of the ocean, and this ooze is 2,000 fathoms deep in some places.

Liebig's experiment of curing intemperance by a strictly farinaceous diet, has been tested in twenty-seven cases in the United States with very good effect.

The stock of sugar at Havana and Matanzas, Cuba, is 20,000 tons less than last year. It is estimated that 500,000 tons have been made in the whole island.

At a meeting of the Management Committee of St. Andrew's Society, Ottawa, lately, it was decided to have a grand band competition in August, at which \$1,000 will be offered in prizes, the first prize being one of \$500.

As an instance of the good feeling which prevails between the native and British troops in India the Pioneer, an Indian journal, mentions two striking incidents. The first was the turning out, to a man, of the 10th Bengal Lancers, to give a parting salute and cheer to the 11th Hussars, on the departure of the latter for England; the second, a similar compliment paid by the Carabiniers, a British regiment, to the 4th squadron of the 10th Bengal Lancers on the embarkation of the latter for Malta. The scene is thus described: "The regiment had marched some three miles to the camp of the Lancer squadron, and when the march was sounded, the Carabiniers, headed by their band, escorted it the whole way through the station to the railway, on reaching which, the Carabiniers formed line, and the Lancer squadron marched along its front to the platform. Colonel Fryer, commanding, gave the squadron a general salute, and then followed 'three cheers for Captain Greenaway and the squadron of the 10th Bengal Lancers.' This was responded to by the whole regiment most heartily. The Lancers returned the salute, cleared the front of the Dragon Guards, whose band played Auld Lang Syne." The Pioneer well remarks that this entente cordiale will make the two regiments doubly strong, if it should chance, as is not unlikely, that they should hereafter serve together.
