Continued from page 1 session at P.W.C. with many people lined up outside awaiting an opportunity to enter.

The entire program was comprised of choral work by school choruses and one class for Junior Girls' Choir. The school choruses each included two grades except for Class 81 which was for any grade with a limit set at fifty pupils.

String Ensemble Among the highlights of the evening session at the Community Centre was a performance by the Kathleen Hornby string ensemble of "After the Ball".

This group received high praise from the adjudicator, who predicted that it will be a tremendous asset to Charlottetown as an orchestral group of this type can become the centre of musical activity in a community.

The ensemble, consisting of seven violins and one cello, performed without a conductor. Mr. Hare advised the group to "do its homework" and advised that a business manager to assist the conductor would be of great assistance to them.

In "Steal Away Little Birds," by Anderson, a choral entry for first year competition, the Parkdale Choral Club was the only entry. The gentle swinging nature of the composition was well realized and the altos in particular showed an admirable spirit, and their enunciation was excellent.

Bass Solo F. M. MacIntyre sang "Port of Many Ships" by Keel and "The Holy City" in bass solo competition, and his very fine voice as usual delighted his listeners.

Mr. Hare praised particularly his smooth and flowing style in the second number.

The Parkdale Choral Club won first honors in the rural two-part women's chorus, "Leaside Lindsay," a Scottish Folk Song, only one point ahead of the Central Royalty Glee Club.

The Hillsboro Choral Group were heard in a four part male chorus for rural entrants, singing "The Miller and the Maid." Mr. Hare complimented the group on their interpretation of the piece, accenting the humor of the composition by emphasizing the staccato notes, and making the audience laugh, exactly what the composer had intended.

Enjoyable Class One of the most enjoyable classes was the baritone solo, in which there were four entrants. The selections were "Rolling Down to Rio" and an own selection. F. M. MacIntyre scored 85 on "Rolling Down to Rio" and "Bless This House" Frank Costello and Robert MacLeod, singing "If All Those Endearing Young Charms" and "None But the Lonely Heart", respectively, as second selections, both won second place for their efforts.

Derrill MacGuigan, unfortunately suffering from a cold, showed a richness and a resonance which the adjudicator advised him to develop. The first song has a rollicking, swinging air to it, and all interpreted it well. Robert MacLeod won special praise for his good tone quality and fine dramatic sense in "None But the Lonely Heart."

The Hillsboro Choral Group No. 2, Mt. Herbert, won top honours in the male quartette for rural entrants, with their rendition of "Nut Brown Maid." Their pitch and staccato notes were particularly good. The Central Royalty Male Quartette No. 1, Mt. Herbert, with "The Hundred Pipers" took second place honours.

Women's Chorus In the women's rural chorus, "Come Let Us Sing a Roundelay," by Rowley, the Central Royalty Glee Club showed charm in their tone, quality and manner, with a cheerful spirit and good articulation to the top honours. The Parkdale Choral Club and the New Glasgow-Hunter River Glee Club took second place honours.

Men's Rural Chorus There were five entrants in the men's rural chorus, and it proved to be a most interesting competition. The highest mark was made by the Hillsboro Choral Group, Mt. Herbert, who sang as though they really appreciated the significance of "A Good Roarin' Fire" with a clear pointed staccato style which helped their presentation greatly. The second place group, the Central Royalty Men's Chorus, the adjudicator suggested, might have accentuated the rhythm a little more, but their spirit was irresistible. The New Glasgow-Hunter River Glee Club won third place, and their's was an excellent interpretation although it was suggested that they might have achieved greater volume.

Mr. Walter Shaw very capably presented Mr. Hare's comments upon the last two classes, as the latter, although he made light of the matter, was unfortunately suffering from a very bad cold.

Fine Opening Mr. Geen commented very favourably on the first class at the evening session at P.W.C., which was the singing by men's choruses of the rollicking "Tramping Song," and said he was very pleased to see so many men in this Province

Discusses Parkdale Streets, Water Supply

Advice to first elect their village commissioners and then have them approach the Government regarding desired improvements was given to the Parkdale Men's Association at their monthly meeting last night by Mr. B. Earle MacDonald, M.L.A., representative of Fifth Queens.

Mr. MacDonald briefly addressed the club on the matter of paving streets and the water supply. While he could make no definite promises he assured the members that they could expect every assistance possible both from the Government and the Water Commissioners.

He said it was difficult to get a sidewalk to the cemetery as the ditch on the side of the road would force installation of a complete drainage system at considerable expense. However, in congratulating the club on having the initiative to organize and try to do something for the community, he reminded them that they were still young in village life and they could not expect to get everything in a day. Since he was elected, he stated, everyone in the district was asking for something and he pointed out that there was only so much money allotted for roads and it could not all be spent in one area. But he offered every assistance he could give Parkdale in its efforts to improve.

Two Selections The Summerside Male Chorus, under the direction of Mr. J.H. Leuty, was the only entry in the two classes for Men's Chorus, City, following the other, Mr. Geen congratulated them highly on their rhythmic rendition of "Let us Merry" and on their obvious enjoyment of their second selection, "Sea Roads".

The competitors in the class for Women's Chorus, City, were jokingly chided by the adjudicator for the support they were receiving from the men in the front rows of the auditorium, after which they were complimented on their efforts. Winners of this class were the girls of the P.W.C. Ensemble with the St. Peter's A.Y.P.A. and the Baptist Girl's Choir, Charlottetown, close behind.

Final number on the program included some stiff competition between five men who each sang their own selection in the Operatic Solo, open.

Mr. Geen told the audience he found this type of music one of the most difficult to sing, requiring great breath control and good dramatic quality. "Consequently" he said, "it is one of the hardest to adjudicate."

In his comments on the individual performances he found much to praise and at the same time was liberal with his suggestions as to how each singer might improve himself.
