

150 Attend Quiet Potato Growers Meeting Last Night At Tignish

Mr. Leo McIsaac, speaking on behalf of the P. E. I. Potato Board, addressed an attentive audience of approximately 150 persons at a potato growers meeting at Tignish last night.

A well conducted and orderly meeting was presided over by Mr. Gregory McInnis, Tignish, who stated the purpose of the meeting and asked for a good hearing for all who wished to take part in the discussion.

Mr. McIsaac said although he was not connected with the Potato Board at the present time he had been last year. He reviewed the reasons for setting up the board and is an attempt for the first time for the farmers of the province to organize in an effort to protect the industry.

He explained the question on the ballot for the forthcoming plebiscite and said the word "compulsion" has been played up far too much by some interests. Under the proposed pool system everyone who bought potatoes to sell outside the province would have to pay the same price thereby controlling the cost of potatoes to the trade and establishing a uniform price.

"The law of supply and demand is not setting the price of potatoes today," he said, "but those dealers who went south last spring and sold P.E.I. seed on the southern market. Under a pool system this would not be done. If the vote is in favour of the board but turns down the compulsory selling agency "we would have a board with no authority and a return to the system of today when a difference of five to thirty cents a bag is being paid for potatoes."

Mr. Gerald Handrahan, Tignish, said that handling potatoes under the Marketing Board is easier but that farmers would have to see that the hired personnel of the board did their job right. The chairman of the meeting considered that if farmers had set up study groups and listened to farm forum plebiscite would not have been necessary.

Mr. Harry Fridham, Montrose, congratulated the speaker on his fine address but said he was not in favour of the pool system. He suggested a means of control of potato surplus as a better way to support the price.

In reply to a question of Mr. Fridham, Mr. McIsaac said the board did not propose to try to handle all the Island crop but to sell to dealers at a set price and they in turn would supply their regular established outlets.

Also taking part in the discussion was Mr. Howard Gavin, Alma.

The stricken girls, ranging in ages from 2 to 16, were residents of the Roman Catholic convent operated by the Sisters of the Presentation of Mary.

No cases were serious and no deaths were reported. Nine of the girls were taken to hospital in Montreal and one is in a hospital in nearby Sorel. Four girls are under observation at the convent.

CCF Convention Urges Election Act Revision

Drastic revision of the Provincial Election Act was called for yesterday in the resolutions passed at the annual convention of the CCF party at Kensington. The changes are asked "before the next election to assure that election being truly democratic."

Among the speakers heard were Rev. J. W. Howe, Carleton; Mr. Murdoch MacLeod, Long River; and Mr. W. I. Green, Stanley Bridge. They dealt mainly with the temperance question and "how to make it impossible for big corporations to destroy peoples lives through liquor."

A nominating committee was named comprising Mr. Roscoe Walker, Kensington; Mr. Irving Toombs, Mr. Murdoch MacLeod and Rev. George Tilley, Cherry Valley; and a program or policy committee of Mr. McFarlane, Rev. J. W. Howe, Carleton; Mr. Herman Mayne, Emerald; Mrs. Leslie Ramsey, Indian River; and Miss Carrie Holman, Summerside. This latter committee brought in the resolutions.

Among those passed were the following: all cars on the road should be insured only by Government company providing the service at cost; cutting the cost of electricity by public ownership; overall health insurance for all Canadians; a long term program of concrete main highway construction.

Another resolution said that the privilege of using tax exempt gasoline for farming and fishing was being abused by the use of such gasoline on the highways and suggested the marking of such gasoline and check-ups to make sure none of it is being used in autos and trucks. The convention also went on record as supporting the principle of producer controlled marketing agencies.

World's Fastest Seaplane Explodes

SAN DIEGO, Calif., (AP)—The world's fastest seaplane, the Convair YF2Y-1 Sea Dart, exploded over San Diego bay Thursday. The plane, making a speed run across the harbor, shattered apart in a huge burst of yellow flame at about 500 feet above the water.

The pilot, Charles E. Reichbourg, was demonstrating the speed and versatility of water-based planes to a crowd watching from Lindbergh field.

The pilot was taken from the water alive but died in a few minutes.

The single-place Sea Dart exceeded the speed of sound in a shallow dive last Aug. 3.

Good Humored Debate Marks Final Potato Meeting In Series At O'Leary

—In a spirit of joviality, with the audience enjoying the good humored debate frequently interspersed with sparkling wit, about 250 persons attended a public meeting in O'Leary hall last evening, concluding a series of meetings throughout Prince County, at which Donald A. MacDonald, chairman of the Potato Marketing Board, and other speakers outlined the Board's policies on which approval is being sought in a plebiscite on November 10th.

The questions asked, were for the most part, the same asked at previous meetings by the same persons, and the same answers were supplied.

In this regard objection was made by Raeford Locke who said that the meeting had been called to give the people of O'Leary and surrounding districts a chance to participate, and he suggested that people from other areas were taking up too much time in remarks and questions that they had made and asked at other meetings in this series.

Among those speaking apparently in opposition to the Marketing Board or its proposals were John Dawson and Hazen Dawson

of Albany, James MacDougall, Summerside; Frank Bryan, Cascumpeque; Everett Hudson, Elm-dale; Neil Bradshaw, Searletown; Frank Hardy, John Rayner, and J. B. Thomas.

Apart from Mr. MacDonald, those supporting the board included Dave Griffin, Charles Yeo, and Raeford Locke.

Mr. Arnold Wood was chairman of the meeting.

The potato estimate at the end of October was received last evening by Mr. MacDonald who said that the Canadian estimate was 50 1/2 million bushels—a decline of 17 million bushels from last year.

He said the outlook was for strengthening prices as the season progresses.

In reply to a question from Hazen Dawson he said the United States estimate is down by 28 million bushels to a total of 345 million.
