

COMPLIMENTARY NOTICES.

We notice that the Ottawa papers contain very complimentary notices of J. Edward Boyd, Esq., C. E., of this city, who has just resigned his position in the Dominion Board of Works, to take charge of the Railway works of Prince Edward Island. The Ottawa Citizen remarks: Mr. J. E. Boyd, C. E., formerly Government Engineer on the European and North American Railway, New Brunswick, and lately on the staff of the Department of Public Works in this city, has been appointed Chief Engineer for the Colony of Prince Edward Island. Mr. Boyd will leave at once for the scene of his future labors. One of the most important works which will be placed under his charge will be the Government Rail way between Georgetown and Summerside, which it has been decided to construct. We sincerely congratulate Mr. Boyd, who is a man of decided ability in his profession, on his good fortune.

The Ottawa Times has the following:—

"Mr. J. E. Boyd, C. E., for several years connected with the Department of Public Works, has resigned his position in the Department, and accepted the position of Chief Engineer on the Prince Edward Island railway. Mr. Boyd is a gentleman of great professional skill and experience, and any work undertaken by him will be certain to be well done. While congratulating him upon the attainment of a good position, we cannot help regretting that the Dominion Government have lost the services of so valuable a man."

We in St. John, who have known Mr. Boyd so well for a series of years, feel at liberty to say that the Ottawa journals have not over-estimated his merits. Mr. Boyd, we understand, will leave immediately to assume his new duty.

[Mr. Boyd came here, in the St. Lawrence on Saturday night. We hear that he will immediately commence the Railway Survey.]

We regret to learn from the Summerside Progress, that Mr. James A. Van Baskirk and Mr. Thomas Kinney, of West Point, who left their place in a boat Monday, and were supposed to have met a water grave. Their boat was picked up at Fifteen Point, bottom up on the Wednesday following, and their bodies have since been found on the Mischoche shoals and indent. This is a sad affair, and should be a warning to others not to venture too far to sea in an open boat, either early or late in the season.

LATE TELEGRAMS.

EUROPEAN.

London, May 8. In the House of Lords this evening the University Test Bill was sustained by five majority.

In the Commons the discussion on the new Army Regulation Bill was resumed. Major Anson, member for the purchase of commissions, while other military members who participated in the debate were divided on the subject. Carlwell denied the charges proposed would subject the officers to loss as the commission sold since introduction of measure brought full prices. On a division the measure was carried by sixty-three against purchase of commissions.

There was rioting to-day at Oldham, originating in a lock-out.

The new battery at Montreuil opened a moderate fire on Paris to-day. Bombardment will be resumed with greater energy to-morrow.

The fire from Issy and Vanviers to-day has been weak.

London, May 9. Consols 93 3/4. Trade at Manchester dull. Liverpool markets quiet and steady. A Versailles despatch of to-day announces the capture of Fort D'Issy.

Clamart has become so unhealthy from the presence of unburied bodies of victims of the many engagements that the Versailles troops were obliged to evacuate the place.

The government relieves from service about Paris and sends to the departments all soldiers having relatives in the capital.

The Versailles army continues its approaches to the Bois de Boulogne.

New York, May 9. The Treaty of Washington, an outline of which is published to-day, meets with general approval from press and people. Gold and exchange steady.

Paris, May 10. There is much wrangling between the central committee and the committee of public safety. The resignation of the latter body is insisted upon by the commune. The sub-committee of organization has issued a proclamation that no quarter shall be shown to the besiegers.

London, May 10. Prince Bismarck consents to reduce the indemnity to 20 millions of pounds.

A treaty of peace was signed to-day at Frankfurt, between Prussia and France.

M. Thiers, in a circular, congratulates France on the capture of Issy, and says the reign of the infamous faction is drawing to a close.

In the House of Commons this evening, the Government Bill relating to the registration of voters, was carried by only 15 majority.

A steamer left to-day to attempt to repair broken Atlantic Telegraph Cables.

The London "Times" in an editorial on the treaty of Washington, says neither England nor Canada ever raised the question of exclusive privilege in the navigation of the St. Lawrence. The only difficulty is as to the plan of adjustment of the Alabama claims.

The Government batteries are firing eighty shots an hour at the wall.

The rebel General Ruesel has been arrested. Assault upon city expected to-day.

London, May 11. With respect to the settlement of the Alabama Claims, it has been arranged that five Commissioners are to be appointed, one by each of the following persons: by Queen of England, Emperor of Brazil, President of Switzerland, President of the United States, and the King of Italy. These five are to meet at Genoa to form rules by which to decide the amounts involved. Afterwards Queen Victoria and President Grant will each appoint one assessor, and the two so appointed will select the third, who will form a Commission, to sit either at Boston or New York, to decide individual applications.

London, May 12. In the Commons this evening, Mr. Munsel, Postmaster General, expressed his inability to explain to the House the reasons why the Company decline to bring American mails.

In the Lords, in reply to question from opposition, Lord Granville declined to state whether English claims on United States will be adjudicated in England.

By the new Franco-German Treaty, just concluded at Frankfurt, Bismarck remits half a million indemnity. The Commercial Treaty is abrogated, and in consideration of further reduction, the control of railways is ceded territory is given to Prussia.

Bismarck has returned to Berlin, and Favre and Pouyer Quertier to Versailles.

A total discharge by Government troops of Paris may take place at any moment. They have continued their preparations without intermission, and now the advance guard is only about five hundred yards from the ramparts.

Russel has been arrested and Delescluse succeeds him.

F. Vanviers was captured and re-captured yesterday, but it cannot be held by the communists.

Russel, according to later despatches, is outside the walls, but is still ready to help the commune.

Gold is closed in New York yesterday at 111 1/2 to 111 3/4.

London, May 12. Consols 93 1/2. No quotable change in Liverpool markets.

Sir John Frederick William Herschel, the only son of the great astronomer, and himself an astronomer of world-wide repute, died to-day.

The London Standard to-day has a despatch asserting that the Communist forces are only 12,000 strong, and that the Versailles army could go into Paris to-day if they would.

Our other hand, communists claim victories, and deny reports of Versailles.

Fort Favre was retaken by the communists at the point of the bayonet. There was also a desperate engagement around Issy, and the communists claim to have re-captured the park of Issy.

UNITED STATES.

Washington, May 9.

The Treaty was signed to-day by the High Commissioner at the Department of State. The gentlemen, after this was done, exchanged congratulations on results of their labors.

The following points will be found to be correct: First—That there are to be two Boards of Arbitration or Commission, to one will refer the St. Lawrence, and the other similar claims, which are recognized as national. The other Board is to take cognizance of miscellaneous claims, British and American, confined principally to periods from commencement to close of the civil war.

Among those are the St. Alban's claims, damage to property by Canadians; but no claims for Fenian invasion of Canada are to be admitted.

The San Juan question will be referred to the arbitration of a friendly sovereign, probably the Emperor of Brazil.

The treaty provides for the free navigation of the St. Lawrence by vessels of the United States and for the use of the Canadian Canals on payment of required tolls. Also provisions regulating the privilege to fish in Canadian waters.

The British Commission, together with Gen. Schoeck, will sail for Europe on the 24th inst. to ratify, or to ratification of the treaty by the senate.

Ottawa, May 9.

Telegrams from Washington yesterday say Treaty was concluded by Joint High Commission and signed at 11 o'clock in the morning.

The Public Works Department is busy preparing plans and specifications for numerous public works.

Tenders for the completion of the tower of Parliament Buildings will be opened to-day.

Reported that Schriber will be Chief Engineer of Inter-Colonial in the absence of Fleming on the Pacific Railway Survey.
