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Survey Suggested At Inquiry Into Parkdale Water Problem

A request for legislation enabling individual citizens of Parkdale and Spring Park to apply to the Charlottetown Water Commissioners to receive water and sewerage service from them where such is adjacent to the citizens property was contained in a brief presented to H.C. St. Clair Trainer as he resumed the hearing before him into the Parkdale water supply.

The brief suggested that the Provincial Government undertake a general survey of the outer Charlottetown area to determine sources of water, probable methods of pumping and storage of same and to inquire into the most economical form of distribution and disposal among the citizens of Charlottetown and the two areas of Spring Park and Parkdale. It was said that those presenting the brief joined with Parkdale in protest.

The brief was presented on behalf of residents of Spring Park and added that where such services could be reasonably effected by expansion an equitable charge might be made.

Appearing for the Spring Park residents following a public meeting held Thursday were Messrs. F. A. Lange, Q.C., J. E. Arsenault, Gordon Rodd and Lloyd MacNeivin who read the brief. It was stated.

Co-op Services Expected To Operate Swift Plant In Ch'town Shortly

All the facilities of the dairy and poultry branch operated by the Swift Canadian Company here are expected to be taken over by the Island Co-op Services, it was learned yesterday.

Negotiations for the transfer have been underway for some time, but have not yet been completed. Local officials of the Swift Canadian Company and the Co-op Services had no comment last night.

If the deal is completed as expected it would mean that the egg grading station, chicken killing plant and the refrigeration rooms, all located in the present Swift plant on Fitzroy Street, as well as the big chicken hatchery in the Parkdale district, would come under the control of the Island Co-op Services. The building on Fitzroy Street which houses the plant would not be involved as it is reported to be rented only.

It is believed that when the transfer is completed, and that is expected to be announced shortly, Mr. Leonard McDonald will be named to be in charge. Mr. McDonald, a former employee of Swift Canadian Company, has been with the Co-op Services since they began their egg and poultry service. He is presently in charge of the egg grading and poultry branches.

Saints Won And Lost In Mainland Debates

Saint Dunstan's University defeated Saint Mary's College and lost to Acadia University in Maritime Intercollegiate debates held on the mainland this week.

A Saint Dunstan's debate team of Messrs. Allan MacDonald and Robert Croken won a unanimous decision over Saint Mary's in Halifax on Thursday night.

The local debaters upheld the affirmative of the resolution "That Communistic activities should be made a criminal offense in Canada." The St. Mary's debaters were Messrs. Roland Dulhanty and Stan MacFadden.

Earlier in the week Acadia University won a split decision over Saint Dunstan's in a debate at Wolfville. The topic of the debate was "Resolved that the Canadian people are excessively taxed."

The Saint Dunstan's debaters, Messrs. Emmett Roche and Richard Wedge upheld the negative. They were opposed by Messrs. Bunty Armstrong and Herman Hyrtle of Acadia.

The loss was the first for Saint Dunstan's in the last two years.

To Attend First Maritime Police School

Cons. Russell Downe and Lloyd Arober of the City Police force, leave today for Halifax to attend a Maritime Police School of instruction, sponsored by the City of Halifax and arranged through the Maritime Chief Constables Association. The school, which will be carried on for 10 days, is the first of its kind to be developed in the Maritime Provinces and will be confined to Constables who have been in the service for three years or over.

Instruction will be given by experienced departmental heads and others with expert knowledge on various phases of police work. Included in the variety of items dealt with will be report writing, police constables on patrol; use of police equipment; (guns, batons, hand-cuffs, etc.); law of arrest; criminal investigating; accident investigation; traffic control and allied problems; criminal code; evidence and prosecution; first aid; civil defence; firearms identification; gas fractures; plaster casts and fingerprints.

Underground Cables For Telephone Co. Now Being Installed

A couple of working crews from the Island Telephone Company took advantage of the favourable weather to run some of the new underground cable installations yesterday and expect to continue the work today.

The largest cable was run from the Telephone Company building down Queen Street to Kent, and contains 3600 wires, or to describe the installation properly, 1800 pairs. A smaller cable, containing 1200 pairs was also installed through the same conduit over the same route. Another 1200 pair cable has been run from Company headquarters on Queen Street to Euston.

Under favorable conditions, other installations will be fanned out on Kent to Prince and other streets now requiring an expanded telephone service.

The lead covered cables are conveyed to the job on huge drums to the manhole locations and are heavily greased to permit smooth running through the conduits as well as protection.

To avoid damage to this valuable equipment and possible interference in the proper working of the circuit, the manholes are equipped with a blind well set at the base, well below the cable run. Any surface water collected in the manholes is carried off at once.

Several of these wells have been enlarged and carried to a depth of 36 feet or more during the past week as an additional precaution. Mr. E. C. Cameron, Plant Superintendent expressed himself as greatly pleased to see this phase of the work advancing so rapidly under present favourable conditions.
