Use of Town Payloader Sparks Heated Debate

SOURIS — The regular monthly meeting of the Souris Town Council was held in the council chambers last night with Mayor C. E. LaVie presiding. Raymond Leard, Andrew Murrain, George MacEachern and Clarence MacDonell were on hand. Councilors Walter Solomon and Elmer Duquette were out of town on business.

The minutes, police and financial reports were adopted as read. The council agreed to have street lights placed at the lower end of Breakwater Street, Michael MacInnis and Roy White were appointed town tax assessors for 1964 and it was also decided that the mayor and as many councillors as possible attend the annual meeting of the Federation of Mayors and Municipalities in Summerside on May 8.

A heated discussion took place regarding the use of the town payloader to remove snow from driveways. Mayor LaVie stated that the payloader had not been used to substitute any bills. They

added further that this took so little time that it would have been wasteful to have billed these citizens.

The town clerk was instructed to inform MacEachern Motors that vehicles belonging to them that are blocking the streets or sidewalks must be moved. They are to be removed in 24 hours or further measures would be taken.

It was decided to erect a no parking sign on Main street on the corner of Main and Breakwater Street.

One building permit was issued to a citizen.

19-Year-Old is Arraigned in Armory Robbery Case

MONTREAL (CP) — A 19-year-old was arraigned Tuesday on the first charge laid in connection with armory robberies in Quebec province earlier this year as police continued without fanfare their hunt for other suspects.

Clara Perron appeared in court in Trois-Rivieres and was retained today to be called get a lawyer. He is charged with theft of arms from the armory of the 2nd Field Artillery Regiment at Shawinigan, Que.

Perron, arrested during the weekend in Montreal, is the first of the 19-year-old members of the L'Arme de Liberation du Quebec to be picked up but the only one to be charged in connection with armory-raiding, for which the ALQ claims responsibility.

Two other suspected members of the separatist organization have been charged with armed robbery in the \$5,000 holdup of a bank at Mont-Royal, Que., last Thursday. They and a juvenile were arrested at a roadblock.

Meanwhile, a provincial police spokesman here said efforts are continuing and possible new tactics being considered — to arrest the remaining ALQ members.

The spokesman said there are at least two suspected ALQ members being sought. City police believe that one of them is a young terrorist who robbed the armory of Les Fusiliers Mont-Royal in Montreal Jan. 29.

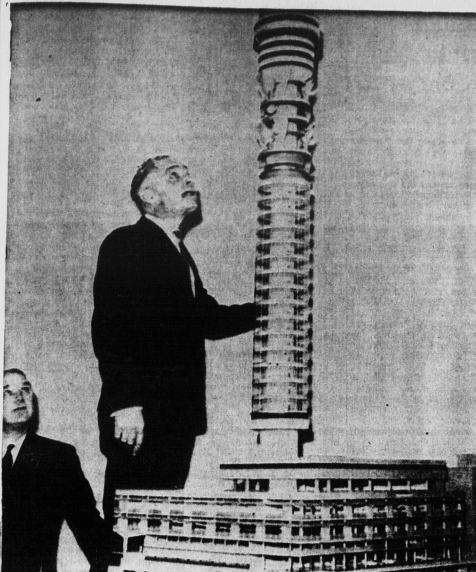
