Guest Speaker At Community Planning Meeting

—Mr. Philip Dumaresq, Halifax, the Nova Scotia representative on the national board of the Community Planning Association was the guest speaker last evening at the first supper meeting of the Summerside Community Planning Unit recently organized in Summerside.

Mr. Dumaresq, after expressing his pleasure at being present to address the Summerside group, gave a most interesting and informative talk on community planning. He dealt with the many problems which had arisen in his home group in Halifax and what they are doing to solve these problems.

"The subject of community planning is a tremendously large project," he said; "it affects everyone, young and old."

In his address he dealt with four main points—master planning, zoning, housing, and traffic. Regarding housing he outlined the steps which can be taken to provide better living conditions in districts for instance where people are living in what he termed sub-standard dwellings. In a most convincing manner he showed how such sections are a great liability to a town or city, how such dwellings actually cost the civic government large sums of money, how such homes are a direct cause of juvenile delinquency, and the means of spreading contagious diseases.

Dr. Henry Moyses, president of the Summerside Community Planning Organization presided and called on Mayor Weir who welcomed the guest speaker and the Charlottetown and Kensington delegates and members to the first supper meeting.

The Mayor said that this is a movement that should have started two years ago at least, but he had found it difficult to find men who would take the necessary interest. In the person of Dr. Moyses he believed he had discovered a man who would accomplish much.

"We are proud of our town," he went on, "our new park and many other facilities we have, but there is room for improvement—there is much that should be done such as zoning, beautification and with an organization such as we have formed I am sure we can expect to see many benefits accrue."

Mr. Allison MacLean presented the proposed by-laws of the local organization which were approved. Reporting for the zoning committee, Mr. Charles Linkletter said his committee felt that the first need is a survey of the town. He suggested an aerial survey so that an up to date map of the town, showing the latest developments, could be made up.

Other speakers at last night's meeting were Dr. P. A. Creelman, chairman of the Charlottetown board who had many valuable suggestions to offer, Mr. Robert Cartwright, representing the Kensington Association, who spoke of his interest in this work and of the progress being made in his town, and Mr. Charles Smith, president of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Community Planning Association who introduced the guest speaker and also answered many questions, which arose regarding community planning.

At the conclusion of the meeting a question and answer period was held.

Dealers Seriously Concerned Over Slump In Potato Market

A check with several potato dealers in Summerside revealed that due to low prices in the uncertain market, all shipment of potatoes from this area has slowed to a virtual standstill.

Most dealers felt that the cause of the present situation was due to the shipment, or threat of shipment, of potatoes from Maine to Montreal and Toronto markets.

One dealer felt that the Potato Marketing Board was largely to blame for keeping the minimum price higher than the market would allow.

Another dealer said a lot of people are inclined to think the marketing Board has let them down, but, he said, the Board cannot shove more potatoes on the market than the market can consume.

The general opinion among the dealers is that present price that can be paid to the farmer at the present time appeared to be about \$1.00 per bag.

A telegram on Friday from Mr. T. J. Inman, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Summerside Board of Trade, requested Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., to interview Hon. James Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture, regarding the potato situation.

The telegram said prices were sliding below cost of production and on behalf of producers and shippers, requested some immediate protection.

The telegram also stated that the quantity of American potatoes coming in free of duty was demoralizing Canadian markets.

A new telegram from Ottawa on Saturday indicated that other representations had been made to Ottawa by Mr. Allison Profit and Mr. William Cairns of Freetown.

One Summerside dealer said that he has heard that potatoes are being trucked across the border from Maine to New Brunswick, and being shipped into Montreal and Toronto at a saving of about 25 cents per hundred pounds.

The dealers also felt that high freight rates from P. E. I. was a factor to be considered. A dealer said it was perhaps not a good idea to suggest an embargo against American potatoes coming into Canada, because the United States might retaliate by preventing Canadian potatoes from entering United States markets, losing a valuable market for both Canadian seed and table stock.

One man explained that the bringing of American potatoes into Canada duty free was a part of the Geneva Trade Agreement by which the United States was given that right while Canada, in return, is allowed to import fruit duty free from United States.

Quality of Maine potatoes was reported to be not good, and this, many dealers believe, has an adverse effect on the market. United States wants good quality potatoes in their markets, and the low quality potatoes from Maine are almost sure to be dumped on the Canadian market, according to one dealer.

Some Island potatoes have been sold in Boston and even as far south as Florida. It was hoped that more would go to these places, as they will use old potatoes in Florida during the month of March, and there will probably be some seed moving at about that time also.

At the present time however, most dealers would rather not handle any potatoes because they would have to do so at prices less than the prices set by the potato marketing board, and at prices unsatisfactory to the farmer.—S.
