Flyers Take Series Lead With Win Over Dodgers

Jimmy MacDonald's Flyers went one game up in the best three of five final series of the City Baseball League last night at Memorial Field by virtue of their 7-1 victory over the Dodgers.

It was a tight, hard-fought ballgame for five innings but the Dodger infield couldn't find the handle on the ball in the last of the sixth and committed five errors to hand the game to the airmen on a platter.

Donnie MacLean's fireball was hopping as he limited the opposition to 3 lonely hits, two of which were slugged in the third inning to score the only Dodger run and give them a 1-run lead that was erased when pitcher MacLean turned slugger and belted one of Squarebriggs' pitches over the right-field fence in the last half to cause the 1-1 deadlock that lasted until the sixth.

Johnny Squarebriggs was hit for 7 blows and walked two batters but his teammates 7-error total proved disastrous.

Elmer MacNeill came up with an unusual play in the Dodger sixth when he tossed a batter, who had gotten a base hit, out at first.

Brian MacCallum was the victim as he slashed a clean-cut line drive into right that MacNeill picked up on the first hop and the right-fielder's powerful arm was deadly

as he caught the runner by a good two strides.

In contrast to the Dodgers sloppy fielding, the Flyers played brilliantly behind MacLean with Lund, Pineau and Kane playing exceptionally well.

MacLean added a single to his circuit clout to lead the batters, while MacNeill clipped a pair of singles and Kane a double.

Bill Morrill drove in the only run and Kennedy rounded out the Loser Dodger run with a double and Ryan hitting.

Don MacLeod Hurls 2-Hitter At Halifax As Liverpool Takes Big Lead In Finals

HALIFAX, (CP) — Liverpool Larrupers moved closer to the Halifax and District Baseball League championship Tuesday night by thumping Halifax Cardinals 10-2 in the third game of a best-of-nine series. Liverpool now leads the series 3-0.

Halifax led 2-1 until the seventh inning when the heavy bats of Larrupers pounded in four runs. They added one more in the eighth and four more in the ninth.

Don MacLeod, in a sharp performance, held Cardinals to two hits as he went all the way for victory. One of the hits, by pitcher Harley Faisinger, was a homer in the third inning with the sacks empty.

Faisinger completed the first six innings for Halifax, but got relief from Len Overstreet in the hectic seventh. Larrupers' only home run came in this inning with the bases empty.

The two Halifax pitchers gave up 12 hits.

Roberts, Gromek Lead Maiors In "Gopher Balls"

NEW YORK (AP) — Philadelphia's Robin Roberts and Steve Gromek of Detroit Tigers, the gopher ball leaders of the major leagues in 1954, are up to their old grooving habits again this season.

Roberts, who allowed 35 home runs a year ago, already has been solved for 35 round-trippers to top the National League. Gromek has given the most home runs in the American League, 25, after being tagged for 26 during the 1954 campaign.

World Series Sept. 28 Unless Playoff Necessary

NEW YORK (AP) — The 1955 world series will start Wednesday, Sept. 28, in the American League city, unless a playoff is needed to settle the junior circuit's four-team race.

At a meeting of representatives of the contending teams in the offices of baseball commissioner Ford Frick, plans for the series were decided as well as dates and ticket prices.

Five American League clubs—Cleveland, Chicago, New York, Boston and Detroit—and Brooklyn and Milwaukee from the National League were represented at the meeting. Since at least four clubs are still in the running for the American League flag, the start of the world series could not definitely be set.

If a playoff is required the series will start Thursday, Sept. 29. Playoff arrangements will be made by the American League at a meeting to be held in Chicago Sept. 13.

COIN FLIP DECIDES

Present rules provide for a one-game playoff, if two clubs are tied at the season's end Sept. 25. A coin will be tossed to fix the site of the playoff if two clubs tie.

I. L. President Scolds Walker

MONTREAL (CP) — Frank Shaughnessy, president of the International Baseball League, said Tuesday he sent word Sunday to manager Dixie Walker of Rochester Red Wings that it was Walker's "duty to pitch his best men" against Montreal Royals in the Labor Day wind-up to the league schedule.

The Royals took both games of a doubleheader, winning the pennant by half a game over Toronto Maple Leafs.

The league president confirmed comments attributed to him by George Beahon, sports writer for the Rochester Democrat and Chronicle, who quoted Shaughnessy as saying that in his opinion Walker's use of second-line pitching talent "hurt baseball." Walker used Bob Kelly in the first game and Ed Ludwig in the second.

"He should have used first-line pitchers because the pennant was at stake," said Shaughnessy. "Asked if he planned anything further in the matter, Shaughnessy said: 'No. It's up to a manager to decide on his pitcher.'"

Winning or losing Sunday meant little to Rochester, since it already had clinched fourth place and a berth in the playoffs.
