



In Egypt Joseph rose rapidly in the... Joseph was imprisoned and there, with divine aid, he correctly interpreted the dreams of two of Pharaoh's servants.—Genesis 39, 40.

One of the servants remembered this long after, when Pharaoh was a troubled by dreams which no one at court could interpret. Joseph was called before Pharaoh and told him that his dreams meant seven years of plenty, then famine.—Genesis 41:1-32.

Joseph proposed that during the plenteous years a fifth of the produce be saved and stored to provide for the lean years. Pharaoh was so impressed that he placed Joseph in command of all Egypt, second only to him, to carry out his plan.—Genesis 41:33-51.

When famine struck, people from other lands came to Egypt for grain. Among them were Joseph's brothers, who were forgiven and welcomed. So all Joseph's family settled in Egypt.—Genesis 42-43:57.

When Joseph is finally taken from prison and called before Pharaoh, special mention is made of the fact that he shaved. This is probably because, as the ancient historian Herodotus tells us, the Egyptians grew beards only when mourning, or in low position in Palestine, on the other hand, the beard was considered ornamental. Joseph, therefore, would probably have shaved in order to go when before Pharaoh.

The month of September is more like the beginning of a new year than January. It opens the school year. Each home shows a different sentiment: in one it is a time to begin school; in another where the young child starts off to school and the mother is left alone.

By September exercises its influence over a wider range than that of the school children. It is a time when we seem to awaken from the laziness of the holiday season, and we decide to be active again. It is an open season for the youngers, night schools, extension courses and for the adults.

CO-OPERATION
The point of our inquiry is this: Why this great fall-out in a reasonably ambitious effort? It occurs not only among adults, but also among boys and girls in high school, and even in the university. Suppose we take a brief look at what we are trying to accomplish by education.

Education must involve the development of skills, but even more important, the mature development of persons. Education must be a part of life, but not a part of it automatically. We are designed to live in a social order and co-operate with others by a sort of divine restlessness which is in our nature.
