1,000 Cords Pulp Loaded At Souris

The S.S. "Ingwi" registered in Bergen, Norway, 1,066-ton, manned by 22 of a crew, captain Ivar Thowen, arrived in Souris Wednesday morning from Summerside where she discharged a cargo of fertilizer and took on 500 cords of peeled pulp.

Loading operations started shortly after arrival. They continued till 6 o'clock Wednesday night, resumed again yesterday morning at 8 o'clock and were completed last evening at 6.30. She had taken on 1,000 cords of peeled pulp. She will sail for England.

Increase Shown In Freight Traffic

The extensive movement of potatoes by rail from the Province resulted in an overall increase of 49 cars shipped via Borden and Cape Tormentine during October as compared to the export movement during the same period last year. But the potato shipment increase of 86 cars was somewhat offset by a decrease in the number of turnips which showed that 69 cars were shipped this year while 107 cars left the Island in the same period of 1953. This information is contained in the monthly traffic statement of the Canadian National Railways issued by the office of the Superintendent, Charlottetown.

Imports to the Island via Tormentine and Borden also showed a considerable upswing with a total of 1,322 cars being ferried to the province in comparison to 1,158 for the same period the previous year. Two items were largely responsible for this increase namely, coal, of which there were 248 cars imported to the 177 shipped here in 1953, and sand stone and gravel showing an increase of 85 cars to 127 cars.

The following are some of the more important imports with last year's figures in brackets: Autos 17 (40), flour and feed 103 (74), gas and oils 212 (200), lumber 35 (17), livestock 4 (18), meats 30 (16), machinery 7 (4), canned goods 19 (16), brick and cement 49 (26).

The more important exports were fish, 14 (10), livestock 105 (99), meats 28 (18), oats 13 (12), potatoes 528 (742), hides 4 (1), canned goods 5 (5), hay and straw 1 (2), more 6 (9), blueberries 11 (5), vegetables 11 (3).

Of the cars forwarded from Cape Tormentine to Borden, 1,094 were destined to points between Charlottetown, Borden and Summerside; 129 to points East and South of Charlottetown and 102 to points West of Summerside. Of those forwarded from Borden to Cape Tormentine, 765 originated at points between Charlottetown, Borden and Summerside; 233 at points East and South of Charlottetown and 202 at points West of Summerside.
