New Minister At Baptist Church



It is expected that Rev. W. A. Harper (above) who has accepted a call to the pastorate of the Summerside Baptist Church, will arrive here tomorrow with Mrs. Harper and their two daughters, Joyce and Kaye. He will conduct the Sunday services.

Rev. W. A. Harper spent his early life in Middle Sackville, N. B. He attended Acadia University from which he received the degree of Bachelor of Theology in 1931. He was ordained to the Christian ministry the same year and took over the pastorate of the Isaac's Harbour and Goldboro Churches in Guysboro County, N. S.

This was followed by a pastorate at MacNaquac, N. B. From this church he went to Lawrenceville in 1941 where he has had a most successful pastorate as well as serving other churches in the vicinity.

Mrs. Harper (nee Bertha Whitman) was reared under the roof of "The Penitence," being the daughter of Rev. N. A. and Mrs. Whitman, now retired at Sunny Beach.

Rev. Mr. Harper succeeds Rev. E. J. Barrass, who resigned his ministry here about six months ago due to ill health. He and Mrs. Barrass are now living at Wilmot.—S

Death Of Former Islander In Hudson

The death is reported recently from Hudson, Mass., of Dr. Norman M. Hunter, 77, banker and retired physician.

Dr. Hunter was born in Alberton, P.E.I., and had lived in Hudson 50 years. He was a practicing physician for 39 years and served several terms as medical examiner. In 1928 he retired from the medical profession when he became president of the Hudson National Bank, a post which he held until his death. Dr. Hunter was also assistant treasurer of the Hudson Co-operative Bank and a trustee of the Hudson Savings Bank.

Member of several medical societies, Dr. Hunter was the oldest past master of the Doric Lodge of Masons and he was also a member of the Odd Fellows.

He leaves a wife, Mabel (Wood); two sons, Donald of Leominster and William Hunter of Fitchburg; and two sisters, Mrs. Lucy Gordon and Mrs. Alice Smythe of Alberton, P.E.I.

Prefer Fixed Prices In Defence Deals

OTTAWA, Nov. 8 —(CP)—Trade Minister Howe today ordered the Canadian Commercial Corporation to adhere to the general policy of giving preference to Canadian business men who quote fixed prices on defence contracts.

In recent weeks there has been a tendency among some manufacturers and suppliers bidding on defence orders to include an escalator clause in their tenders, Mr. Howe said.

Maintenance of the crown company's firm price policy means that companies submitting escalator clauses are liable to find their bids in an unfavorable position. An escalator clause means that if costs rise, the increase is passed along to the purchaser. This kind
