QUIZ
 Your right hand opponent deals and bids One Heart, neither side vulnerable. What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?
 1. ♠AKQ72 ♣8 ♠A654 ♠K85
 2. ♠AJ ♠9643 ♠Q8652 ♠AQ
 3. ♠KJ4 ♠9872 ♠AQ5 ♠AJ8
 4. ♠KQJ865 ♠96 ♠AK85 ♠J7
 1. Double. It would be wrong merely to bid one spade over the opening heart bid. Overcalls in the one level are regarded as only competitive bids, and generally deny the values for an opening bid.
 This hand is considerably better than a minimum opening bid, and the way to inform partner of the great strength held is to make use of the informatory double. In most cases the doubler has no outstanding suit of his own and seeks to find the proper trump suit by forcing partner to select one, but the presence of a good suit should not deter him from doubling when he has a strong enough hand. The informatory double primarily denotes a good hand, and additionally requests partner to respond in the light of this knowledge.
 2. Pass. It is extremely dangerous to overcall with two diamonds on a suit of such weak texture. A penalty double of two diamonds could result in a severe set. Overcalls should be based much more on trick-taking values than on high card points. It is true that we have the values for an opening bid, but this is not the sole criterion. Safety is a more important factor.
 The informatory double is ruled out because we are not prepared for a one spade or two club response. Remember that partner's response to a double is forced, and that his hand may be very poor.
 3. One notrump. With 17 high card points the choice lies between doubling or bidding one notrump. A much more exact picture of the distribution and held cards is transmitted to partner by overcalling with one notrump. The notrump overall is very similar to an opening bid of one notrump. Partner responds to the notrump bid as though it were the first bid of the auction.
 4. Four spades. This is a shot in the dark, but there are substantial advantages to be gained. Partner needs little more than the queen of diamonds to provide trick tricks, which is a good enough reason to undertake a game directly.
 But more than that is the advantage that may be gained by hampering the opponents in their smooth exchange of information. The rush tactics may succeed in silencing the enemy when they should continue bidding, or excite them into bidding further when they should remain silent. Excellent results are frequently obtained by putting pressure on the opponents.

European Currency Changes Meet Optimistic Reaction


LONDON (CP) — Western Europe's big weekend currency changes received a cautious but optimistic reaction Monday in world money markets.
 Most dealers, attending their first trading day since Dec. 24, held back until the effect of the changes on exchange rates became clear.
 However, there were signs of confidence—especially in London and Paris—in the action of Britain, France and eight other West European countries in making their currency more freely convertible.
 In London, British government stocks and industrial shares boomed after 9 a.m. when all sterling holders not living in the sterling area were allowed to change pounds for dollars or other money.
STERLING DIPS, FIRMS
 Sterling itself dipped slightly in London's Foreign Exchange market as trading began, but turned firmer as it continued.
 British government bonds, closely tied to sterling's fortunes, were in strong demand here. Prices of British government stocks and industrial securities moved up sharply.
 In Paris, the French franc rose on the Paris Gold and Foreign Exchange markets and prices also were generally well up on the stock exchange. Part of the trend was attributed to the good reception Premier de Gaulle's new austerity budget was winning among financiers.
 Paris financial circles said the sharp demand for French shares was caused by two factors: The new budget's tax burden on companies was not as stiff as expected; and the government's intention to boost investment and open the French market for foreign raw materials and equipment.
 For the first time in the memory of "free market" dealers, the United States dollar was quoted on the unofficial market below the official rate. Sales went at 492 francs to the dollar, compared to the new post-devaluation rate of 493.
SUSPEND QUOTES
 Swiss banks temporarily suspended regular banknote quotations on the free market while the new currencies stabilized.
 British financiers expressed confidence that an era of expanding trade is on the way.
 Britain took a calculated risk by leading the European move to freer convertibility. The decision means that foreign holders of sterling can easily convert to dollars—and the value of foreign-held sterling is estimated at \$600,000,000.
 But the government was sure that total sterling area reserves of around \$3,214,000,000 could cope with any run on the bank.
 At the same time, the Opposition Labor party declared itself unconvinced of the long-term merits of the move. It scheduled a meeting of its leaders for Wednesday to consider a stand. A parliamentary debate after the House of Commons reassembles in January is likely.

De Gaulle Named Man Of The Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Time, the weekly news magazine, Monday announced its selection of President-elect Charles de Gaulle of France as its man of the year. His picture will appear on the cover of the year-end edition coming out Tuesday.
 Previously, editors of 3,700 radio stations and newspapers had similarly selected de Gaulle as man of the year in a poll taken by the Associated Press.
 Time since 1927 has chosen 43 outstanding news personalities the year one who "dominated the news of the year and left an indelible mark—for good or evil—on history."
 The magazine's man of the year last year was Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.
 Voting in a Canadian Press poll, telegraph editors of Canada's daily newspapers on Dec. 23 named Gen. de Gaulle as the world's top news personality. He was chosen by a slight margin over Khrushchev, last year's top choice in the CP poll.


