Fewer Donors At Alberton Blood Clinic

For the first time Alberton's Red Cross blood donor clinic was held in the afternoon and results were rather disappointing, the number of donors being smaller than at any of the previous peacetime clinics. This decrease is doubtless due to the fact that haymaking is late this year and farmers felt they could not leave their fields even for so worthy a cause as a blood donor clinic.

The one encouraging feature of yesterday's clinic is that there were twelve new donors among the thirty-nine who volunteered. Three of those who were willing to donate were rejected so only thirty-six bottles of blood were obtained.

Donors listed by school districts were as follows: Alberton—15 (one of these rejected), Montrose—6 (South Kildare—4 (one of these rejected), Elmisdale—4 (one rejected), Alma—3, Dock—3, Mill River—1. Other communities outside the area—3.

Dr. W. P. Earle was in charge of the clinic. Lunch was provided by members of Mill River and Montrose Women's Institutes. Alberton Institute permitted the use of their hall, provided tea and served the refreshments. Mrs. Eric Corbett, R.N., assisted the clinic staff and Mrs. A. C. Green acted as registrar. Several young men of the town gave assistance in unloading the clinic equipment.

Singing Sword Wins Memorial 2-Year-Old Trot

GOSHEN, N.Y., Aug. 5 — (AP) — Singing Sword, owned by Mrs. Margaret Critchfield of Wooster, Ohio, outgamed Kimberley Kid in the stretch to win the \$17,200 Arthur S. Tompkins Memorial Two-Year-Old Trot at Good Time Park today.

Each won his elimination heat in the same time — 2:08 2/5. Tom Berry drove Kimberley Kid, owned by the Alwood Stables of Far Hills, N.J., and Del Miller was in Singing Sword's sulky.

Miller took over the reins of Sir Lullwater, runner-up to Kimberley Kid, in the final and Harry Harvey was up behind the Ohio-owned trotter.

Kimberley Kid broke at the start of the final heat but regained his stride and moved into contention at the three-quarter pole. But in the drive through the stretch he was unable to catch the fast-stepping Singing Sword, which once more trotted the mile in 2:08 2/5.

Miller and Berry hooked up the final heat of the \$15,363.85 Geers stake for two-year-old pacers and Del won out when he claimed his horse, Keystone, was interfered with at the head of the stretch. The time was 2:10 3/5.

Gosling, stablemate of Kimberley Kid, and a \$55,000 purchase as a yearling, won the first elimination heat from George H. Tipling's Key-White, Hill, owned by Dr. F. R. McNabb, Ithaca, Mich., captured the second elimination but was scratched from the deciding heat.

Mix Machine On Western Road

The Seaman Mix machine which is presently working between O'Leary and West Cape, will shortly begin operations at Tignish and work eastward on the Western road for a distance of three miles. Some difficulty has developed through the nature of the run-of-the-pit gravel on the western job, which it is stated is not of the same texture as that available and used on the Murray Harbour job.

The difficulty will be overcome, according to Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, who has been up west on the problem several times with his Deputy Minister, Mr. R. G. White.

"It must not be forgotten," said Mr. MacKinnon, "that much of this work is an experiment, and we are cautiously dealing with each situation as it arises, in the hope that we will eventually overcome many of the local difficulties encountered in improving our highways at a cost within our budget."
