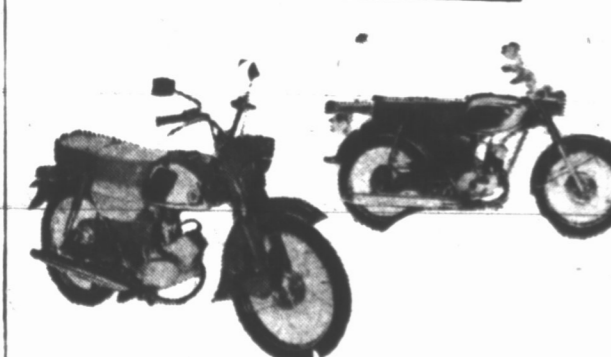

ROSS AND VEZINA

Two Individual Awards At Stake Over Weekend

By THE CANADIAN PRESS The National Hockey League's two top individual awards—the Vezina and Art Ross trophies—are at stake when Toronto Maple Leafs meet Detroit Red Wings in their final two games of the schedule this weekend.

With Toronto goaltender Terry Sawchuk currently leading Detroit's Roger Crozier by one goal in the race for the Vezina Trophy—awarded to the goalie who has played the most games for the team with the fewest goals scored against—himself, the Leafs probably won't be as generous as they were earlier in the week.

The Leafs almost handed the Wings the league championship Wednesday night by defeating Montreal Canadiens 3-2 in Toronto. It gave Detroit a two-point lead over Montreal and the Wings took advantage Thursday night by sewing it up with a 7-4 win over New York Rangers.

Even if Montreal gained a point tie with the Wings by winning the final two games, Detroit would still win the Prince of Wales Trophy by virtue of more wins over the 70-game haul.

The Wings travel to Toronto tonight and play host to the Leafs in Detroit Sunday. There is still the possibility that Norm Ullman can win the Art Ross scoring championship.

CHANCE REMOTE But it will need a big effort by the Leafs if the Detroit centre is to overtake Chicago Black Hawks' Stan Mikita for the Ross trophy and the \$1,000 that goes with it.

Mikita, with 87 points and one game remaining against Boston Bruins Sunday, has a five-point lead on Ullman. His 82 points is the highest total the 29-year-old has achieved since joining the Wings during the 1955-56 season.

The only other player with a remote hope of catching the scoring leaders is Detroit's Gordie Howe but with only 76 points, the nine-point difference would appear too much for the Wings' superstar.

HALL IN RUNNING Chicago's Glenn Hall, out of action for most of the last half of the season, could still overtake Sawchuk and Crozier too, if he can get back into the game.

Hall, who has been replaced by Dennis Dejorj, has 173 goals against, while Crozier has 170 and Sawchuk 169. A \$1,000 bonus also accompanies the Vezina Trophy, while the runner up receives \$500. Crozier, Ullman, and Howe, Delvecchio were singled out by coach Sid Abel after the Wings won the championship Thursday night as the chief factors in the stretch drive.

In the only two other remaining games of the season, Montreal plays host to Boston tonight and travels to New York for a game against the Rangers Sunday.

None of the weekend games have any bearing on the final league standings. Montreal will finish second, Chicago third and Toronto fourth.

Abel announced Friday that three players from the Memphis farm team in the Central Professional League will join the Wings Monday as reserve strength in case of injury for the playoffs.

Called up were Ron Harris, 22, defenceman-right winger, Bob Wall, 22, defenceman and goalie George Gardner also 22.

The Memphis club finished fifth in the CPHL and will conclude its regular season Sunday.

Cpl. W. J. R. (Mac) MacDonald brought some prestige to the Borden minor program when his Missisquoi team of the Island title and this marked the first time that a Borden Minor team landed an Island championship. The MacDonald coached forces played exhibition games throughout the season and when playoff time rolled around they met Craupud in the quarter finals in a home and home total goal affair and the Borden pucksters squeezed by Craupud by a one goal margin.
