Insurance Rates Cut On Dwellings

The Prince Edward Island Board of Insurance Underwriters said yesterday that its member companies have granted reductions in first insurance rates on most types of dwellings in Prince Edward Island.

The reductions range from 10 to 30 per cent on single or duplex dwellings and are effective on new and renewal business as of March 1, 1962. Maximum reductions are granted to single-family, owner-occupied dwellings complying with certain conditions. These reductions reflect a favorable loss ratio and, in some instances are also due to improved fire protection.

The towns of Souris and Montague and the villages of Sherwood and Wellington have recently installed additional fire-fighting facilities and for this reason additional rate reductions were granted in these areas.

Big Drop Noted In Ferry Deficit

OTTAWA (CP) — The Newfoundland ferry service operated by the CNR ran up a \$685,792 deficit in 1961, and the railway's car ferry service to Prince Edward Island had a deficit of \$139,552.

The failures were shown Monday in final supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year tabbed in the Commons.

The 1961 deficit for the Newfoundland ferry compares with the 1960 deficit of \$2,820. The P.E.I. ferry deficit, however, is down sharply from \$322,464 in 1960.

B.C. Premier, Fleming Meet On Bin Project

OTTAWA (CP) — Premier Bennett of British Columbia and Finance Minister Fleming, general and smiling, said here they have had friendly talks on the Columbia River power impasse and hope to meet again "before too long."

They indicated after an hour-long meeting Monday that disposal of Canada's share of the power, generated in the United States from Columbia River storage, is still a stumbling block.

But that was about all they had to report, other than a heavy emphasis on the friendliness of talks held Sunday and again today.

Mr. Bennett later flew on to New York for a day before returning to Victoria.

"There is nothing of a definitive nature," said Mr. Fleming. "There had been thorough discussion, he said in parrying a number of pointed questions covering the dispute about executing a \$450,000,000 storage and flood-control system on the Columbia. Mr. Fleming did reveal that the federal loan offer of \$172,000,000 for the Columbia — to cover half the cost of three storage dams — hasn't been discussed since last spring. Mr. Arthur MacKinnon, when the debate will be "Resolved that there should be prohibition on the sale and manufacture of all intoxicating beverages."
