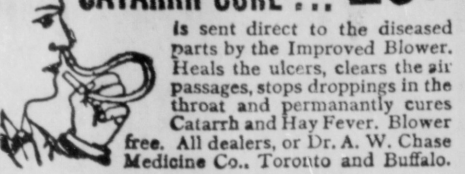

THE BOERS AT ST. HELENA.

The London Daily Telegraph publishes the following letter, which Colonel Schiel, the well-known German soldier in the service of the Boers, who is now prisoner of war at St. Helena, has addressed to a friend:

St. Helena, June 15, 1900.

My dear—You will no doubt be surprised that I have not written since I arrived here, but the fact is I have been extremely busy with my book, "In British Hands," which will shortly be published by Methuen and Company, London, so I must admit to have neglected all my correspondence. I thank you for sending the—in which I only have again been made the butt of newspaper invention. I know that you sympathized with me when you saw that article with the illustration of my landing here. Like so many others, that description is a freak of imagination on the part of some energetic reporter. It is true that I have been suspected of attempting to escape, but you will be amused when I tell you how this suspicion arose.

On Sunday afternoon the mail boat had just arrived. I was standing on the after hurricane deck conversing with an officer, and on the lower deck a sentry was pacing up and down.

At once it may have struck that smart militiaman, not having any opportunity to distinguish himself and gain a stripe, to report that he saw me signalling to a Dutch man-of-war which was then in the harbour.

Such certainly would have been impossible, or at any rate very foolish, on my part, as the British cruiser Niobe was lying between our transport and the Dutch warship. Any such signalling would have undoubtedly been seen by the sentries of that vessel.

Anyhow, next morning I was brought up to the Citadel, and was rather pleased than otherwise to be on shore again. The description that I had been greeted with a demonstration by the sailors and soldiers who, on seeing me, started singing "Rule Britannia," and "Soldiers of the Queen" is untrue.

I myself certainly should not care had such been the case; no doubt both are pretty songs, and I was always enjoy hearing them. But to do justice to the sailors and soldiers, I must say that they have generally shown too much tact as to offend prisoners of war. There are some newspaper reporters who could learn something from them in this way.

The facts are, by going up Ladder Hill, being Easter Monday, a party of sailors singing and celebrating the holiday came down the road, and seeing us stopped at once, saluting me, who was now seated in the cart, most politely. The most amusing part of the sketch you sent me is that only my feet can be seen behind the cart. I wanted to walk through the town, and I did walk. The gentleman in the cart is a Captain De Wit Hamer, and the one in white is a Mr. Waldeck, of the Johannesburg detective force.

In the meantime, the case had been examined on its merits by Colonel

Leeffe, and I was then brought to our camp the following day.

The evening at the Citadel I had a very nice supper sent to me by the Governor's lady, so my temporary stay there was not at all unpleasant.

The camp of ours is a large enclosure, situated on a breezy upland called "Deadwood." It is healthy and the surrounding country is pretty. I may say that it is without doubt the best camp we have had yet. All of us, both officers and men, have no reason whatever to complain.

The treatment is both courteous and considerate.

The rations given are of the best quality, and of a generous quantity; in fact, I have never seen better beef than that which we get here.

Our commanding officers, Colonel Leeffe and Evans, of the Marine Artillery, do all in their power to make our lot as comfortable as possible.

Our principal officers are out on parole, and I personally have rented a little cottage in a valley near the camp. Colonel Leeffe has been kind enough to allow a certain number of our prisoners out daily to work, thus enabling them to earn a very fair payment. You therefore will see that there is no reason to be anxious regarding me on the score of treatment, and I wish that you will be kind enough to inform—likewise.

I had a letter this week from my second boy, that three of them have been at the front, the youngest alone remaining with his mother at the farm.

All three are at home now, one having been wounded and two contracted the fever at Crocodile River while operating against Colonel Plumer's force.

Trusting that this letter will find you in the best of health, as it leaves me at this time of writing, I remain, with kind regards to your husband, yours faithfully.
