Open Teachers Convention

The first day's sessions of the Charlottetown Teachers' Institute met at Queen Charlotte High School Thursday. The President then called on Mr. Fred Driscoll to report on the committee named to organize social evenings for the teachers. He stated that all seemed to enjoy themselves at these socials.

Bert Croken in the absence of the chairman Mrs. Dorothy Malone of the salary committee gave the report concerning the schedule for city teachers.

TEACHER SHORTAGE
Miss Estelle Bowness, General Secretary of the P.E.I.T.F. in her report indicated that 1956-57 was a particularly busy year—

“One of growth for our Federation—number one problem in education on P.E.I. is teacher shortage—teachers, you must remember that the profession you have chosen is your responsibility—what you make of it is in your hands—its future is your future and your success depends on the way you accept your responsibilities.”

Speaking about workshops held by the various locals Miss Bowness said “we see interest among members as we never have seen before.” She went on to say “our Federation will be a strong united unit when we have interested and active members working at the local level.”

Commenting on the Easter Convention she remarked “as to the programme it is getting to be a problem to know what to have. We must have something worthwhile. Suggestions from the teachers will be greatly appreciated.”

In speaking on Education Week, Miss Bowness noted the good work accomplished by the newly formed committee known as the Public Attitudes Committee.

In conclusion, the General Secretary presented the following question to the teachers for their consideration: “Are we as teachers of P.E.I. taking our full share of responsibility in solving the problems of education in the areas in which we live?”

J.R.W. Williams congratulated Miss Bowness on her magnificent report and he hoped that mimeographed copies would be made for future workshops.

The teachers next broke up into groups according to the grade in which they teach. This permitted the teachers to discuss their problems together.

CURRICULUM
The second session opened at 1:30 p.m. Malcolm MacKenzie, Director of Curriculum for public schools in P.E.I., addressed the convention. During his remarks he explained the changes made in the curriculum.

Following Mr. MacKenzie's little study groups. Each group studied a particular subject such as Choral reading, Language, Art, Junior Arithmetic and social studies. The teachers found these study periods very profitable.

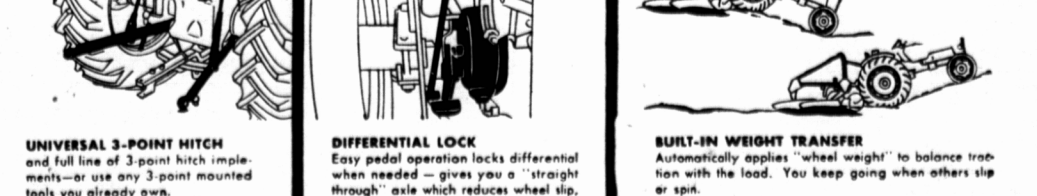
