PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

FRIDAY, April 29.

House met at 12 o'clock. Mr. Bell presented a petition from certain residents of Summerside protesting against the passage of the bill incorporating the Summerside Waterworks and Sewerage Company. Laid on the table.

Mr. Shaw reminded the leader of the Government and the commissioner of Public Works that certain information asked for early in the season regarding the proposed New Prince of Wales College and the new wing to the Hospital for the Insane was not forthcoming. There were also other questions that had not been answered.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the information asked for would be tabled when it was made ready and not before. The work of preparing the information would take up considerable time.

Hon. Mr. McLean tabled the tenders for the Prince of Wales College received under the plan of Mr. Chappell.

On motion of Mr. A. Peters the bill incorporating the Charlottetown Light and Power Company was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Farquharson the bill amending the act incorporating the Y. M. C. A. was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Lefurgey the bill for the preservation of partridge was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. J. E. McDonald the bill incorporating the Ecclesiastical Society of St. Bernard was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Sinclair the House went into committee on the bill incorporating the Stanley Bridge Foresters Hall Company, Mr. Forbes in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to and ordered to be read a third time to-morrow.

Hon. Mr. Warburton moved that the House go into committee on the bill providing for the introduction of a system of sewers for Charlottetown. He was explaining the provisions of the bill when recess was taken at one o'clock.
