A GREAT RACE ARRANGED.—The two great special stakes, which were opened by the Monmouth, N. J., Park Association, for the purpose of bringing all the best horses together, have received even more numerous entries than was anticipated by those who professed to know. Since Ironsides won the Derby there has been an earnest desire expressed by turfmen in this country to see him run in company with other horses of the highest class, and upon his arrival the Monmouth Park Association lost no time in formulating a stake, the conditions of which would suit the owners and test the merits of their horses at a fair distance with respectable weights. It was called the Monmouth Stakes, of \$500 each, half forfeit, with \$5,000 added, the winner to receive \$1,000 out of the stakes; seven seven pounds above the scale; one mile and a half.
