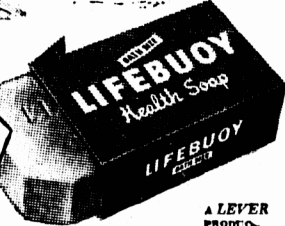

Sunday School Convention Held At O'Leary Church

On Tuesday June 6th there was a very successful Sunday School Convention held in the O'Leary United Church and comprising representatives of the various Sunday Schools of the United and Baptist denominations in the O'Leary-Alberton district. The president, Mr. Earl Jelly B. A. of O'Leary presided. The opening devotions were led by Rev. John M. Sheen of Elmsdale United Church. The guest speaker was Mr. Whitely B. Dalrymple, Secretary of the Maritime Religious Education Council. Reports were given from the various Sunday Schools of the Convention. They were all from United Church Sunday Schools except one, the Knutsford Baptist Sunday School, which was given by the minister, Rev. C. O. Howlett.

The reports showed that much excellent work is being done. The largest Sunday School in the O'Leary-Alberton district is the O'Leary United Church Sunday School which has an enrollment of one hundred, followed by the Elmsdale United Church Sunday School which has sixty on the roll. Mr. Dalrymple advocated more stress to be placed on Teacher Training programs and also Church Vacation Bible Schools. He said that the results of the work in the Sunday Schools of the O'Leary-Alberton Convention compared very favorably with the best of the Sunday Schools in other conventions in the Maritimes.

The Ladies Aid of the O'Leary United Church served lunch at the supper hour. The evening devotions were taken by Rev. W. G. Dickson of O'Leary. Mrs. Watson Silliker was heard in a much enjoyed solo. Rev. Blair Colborne of West Cape presented the report of the committee on courtesies and Rev. John M. Sheen reported for the nominating committee as follows: President, Mr. Earl Jelly of O'Leary; Secretary, Mrs. Hudson of Alberton; 1st. Vice, President, Mrs. Ivey MacFadyen of Brae; 2nd Vice-President, Mrs. W. Stewart, Cape Wolfe; 3rd Vice-President, John Mountain, Montrose.

The guest speaker then showed how to help and gave details how to make Sunday School work more interesting and attractive to children and young people. Mr. Dalrymple also spoke on the work of the M. R. E. C. and showed slides dealing with Sunday School work. The Maritime Baptist Convention, the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada, the Maritime Convention of the Church of Christ Disciples, the Young Men's and the Young Women's Christian Associations and the Student Christian Movement work together in the Maritime Religious Education Council. The M. R. E. C. serves 10,000 volunteers who are teachers in 1,500 Sunday Schools. The training program includes Sunday School conventions, Leadership Training Schools, etc. For 7,000 teen age boys and girls the M. R. E. C. promotes C. G. I. T. Camps, Vesper Services, Tuxis and Trail Rangers. The M. R. E. C. serves 1,800 children in Church Vacation Schools, Explorer groups and a Junior camp. The M. R. E. C. also serves 1,700 campers in the following camps - Waweig, Weggessan, Chaleur, Elm Tree, White Breagh, August Cove, Chance Harbor, Pinehurst and Pagewood. The convention concluded by Mr. Dalrymple giving a short but interesting talk on the theme of the convention "Ambassadors for Christ". The Benediction was pronounced by Rev. H. M. Burgess of O'Leary. - O

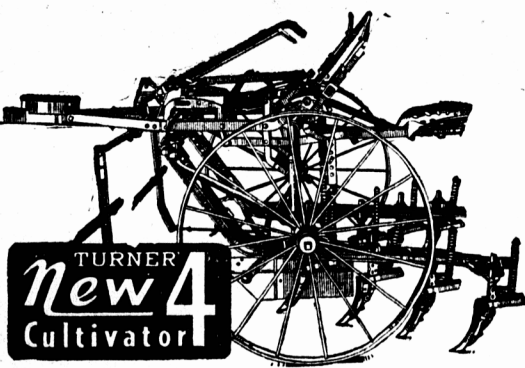
