Cost Of Social Assistance Discussed By City Council

The take-over by the Provincial Government of the social assistance and of the proposed "low-rental" housing program were among the matters discussed at the June meeting of the Charlottetown City Council, held yesterday afternoon.
Yesterday's meeting was chaired by deputy mayor, Dorothy Corrigan, in the absence of His Worship, Mayor Walter Cox, who is in Vancouver to attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities.
The discussion on welfare came up when Councillor Elmer MacRae was presenting the bills, in the absence of finance committee chairman, John P. Nicholson, who is with Mayor Cox in Vancouver.
Mr. MacRae noted that the city was still paying substantial welfare bills and said that he had been under the impression that this burden was to be taken over and paid by the provincial government. Councillor Arthur Wright who was chairman of the welfare committee, explained that while this was supposed to have been taken over on April 1, the provincial government was awaiting federal legislation before they could proceed with the payments.
CITES EXAMPLES
Mr. MacRae also noted that he felt that some of the money being disbursed by the city's welfare agencies was being abused and he cited examples of this abuse.
Still on welfare Councillor Wright said that under the new system, rentals which are now paid for by the local agencies will not be eligible for reimbursement by the provincial government and he said some arrangement was trying to be worked out whereby the city's welfare expenses would be 100 per cent reimbursable.
On the matter of the low-rental housing program, which the city was considering undertaking,

Director Addresses Meeting

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
Deputy Mayor Preston D. MacLure, presided over the regular monthly meeting of the Montague Town Council last evening in the absence of Mayor B.H. Aeo who is presently attending a provincial convention in British Columbia.
Present for the meeting was Claude Smith, director of town planning for the province. Mr. Smith briefly outlined town planning regulations as they would pertain to the town of Montague. No decision was reached with references to joining the plan however it is to be considered and further discussion will take place after each councillor has a chance to study the regulations.
The general business of the town for the month was dealt with and a decision to call tenders to have the Collins building behind the town building torn down to make way for parking was reached.
Nat Campbell was present and requested a permit for the erection of a service station on the north east side of the Montague bridge, this being his own property. However the council felt they were not in a position to grant such a permit as the frontage borders on the Montague bridge and therefore would be a department of public works decision for the greater part and also the public utilities decision Mr. Campbell was asked to draw up a plan which he could present to the town for consideration also.

During the presentation of reports the chairman of the police committee, Councillor A.H.H. Robertson called on policeman Ed Downe to make his report which showed that 14 cases had been before the court for the Control Act and two under high way traffic.
A number of properties are to be sold by the county sheriff for arrears of taxes.
As an incentive for the location of industry in the town it was approved that any plant or industry wishing to locate in the town would be exempt from municipal taxes for five years and concessions at a lower rate for the following five years.

BEAT CLUB RETURNS
LIVERPOOL, England. (CP) Prime Minister Wilson, member of Parliament for a Liverpool suburb, will perform the re-opening ceremony at the Cavern beat club. The Cavern, birthplace of many Liverpool pop groups including the Beatles, was closed several months ago despite protests from local teen-agers, but will be reopened by a new owner.

MECHANIC TESTIFIES
Arnold Madison, a service station operator and mechanic from Sherbrooke, stated that he had examined the white 1961 Chevrolet car and found it had several bald tires and that the brake pedal had to be pushed halfway down before the brakes were fully on, the brake linings on all four wheels were about half worn but still working efficiently; the car was otherwise in good working order, testified the witness.

TO CONTACT WITH VEHICLE
Joseph Theodore Arsenault, grandfather of Frederick Caissie, said he had been told shortly after 8 o'clock the morning of May 24 that the child had been struck by a car, had run out of the Caissie home and found Frederick by the side of the highway, and had taken him to the Prince County Hospital.
A sworn statement was read from Dr. S.R. Cameron, Summerside, who stated that he had shortly after he was admitted to the Prince County Hospital on the morning of May 24, and found him dead. He had been dead for at least several minutes.
The witnesses testifying were Mary Gall and Cyrus Leo Gallant, students who got on the bus at the Caissie gate, and RCMP Constable Eric Bishop.
Crown prosecutor George R. McMahon represented the crown at the inquest.
Jury members were Walter Burhoe, Lloyd Buell, Anes MacKinnon, William D. Ives, Harley Ings, Edgar Dennis and Borden Myers, all of the city area.

FRICKER ALAN CAISSIE, ST. CHRYSOSTOME died as a result of injuries sustained when coming in contact with a car driven by Mrs. Louise Rose Arsenault at or near Egmont Bay on May 24, 1966. A coroner's jury last night at an inquest in Charlottetown City Hall.
At the beginning of the inquest coroner Dr. C.A. Coady, conducting the inquest, excused Mrs. Arsenault from testifying after Gerald Foster, QC, quoted a Supreme Court decision indicating that she was not a compellable witness. Nine witnesses testified.
Dr. Andres Aquino, associate pathologist with the Department of Health, stated that he had performed an autopsy on the body of Frederick Caissie on May 24 and found the principal cause of death to be extensive lacerations of the liver causing abdominal hemorrhage, blood in the trachea could have been a contributing cause.
