

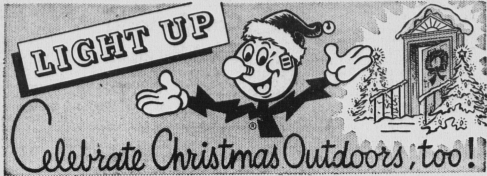
Mental Health Group Founder Dies In Toronto

TORONTO (CP) — Dr. Clarence Meredith Hincks, 79, rated with Dr. C. K. Clarke, founder of the mental health movement in Canada, died in hospital here Thursday of a cerebral aneurysm of the liver.

Dr. Hincks, who graduated from the University of Toronto in 1907, had been in hospital for about a month. In 1917, Dr. Hincks collaborated with Dr. Charles Martin, dean of the University of Toronto, to establish Canada's first mental hygiene clinic. Today, there are more than 150 in the country.

In 1919, in association with Dr. Charles Martin, dean of medicine at McGill University, he pioneered the Canadian Mental Health Association. Dr. Martin was the association's first president.

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Profit And Private Initiative Grow Respectable In U.S.S.R.

Following is the second of two stories by John Best, Canadian Press Moscow correspondent, on proposals that the profit incentive system be used in the Soviet economy.

KHAZKOV, U.S.S.R. (CP) — Profit, material incentive and private initiative are rapidly becoming respectable notions in the Soviet Union.

They are part of the lexicon of a vigorous debate, long muted but now in full bloom, over proposals to release the economy from fetters placed upon it by over-zealous state planning. The words are used by men such as Professor Yevsey Liberman of Kharkov University, leader of a movement to give individual factories greater autonomy.

Professor Liberman told The Canadian Press in an interview that many if not most Soviet economists now agree that central planning on the one hand, and profit seeking and private initiative on the other are "absolutely compatible" ideas. Professor Liberman fielded carefully a question as to prospects for his proposals under the new Soviet leadership as compared with those under former boss Nikita Khrushchev. But his tactful reply left no doubt that he contemplates the new era with optimism. The new Kremlin leaders have shown "a spirit of carefulness and objectiveness—an intention to use scientific principles more seriously than ever," he said.

"This is favorable for economic life at all levels." Both Premier Kosygin and Communist Party first secretary Brezhnev are industrial engineers by profession.

Under the Liberman formula, factories are free to run their operations in the most efficient manner possible on orders received directly from retail outlets, without interference from the central planning organ Gosplan or regional economic councils.

Over-all direction of the economy remains the responsibility of Gosplan.

When he first put forward his proposals some years ago, said the 67-year-old, thin, balding body paid much attention. Later, however, conditions for debate improved and the editor of Pravda invited him to write an article explaining his views. The article, published in September, 1962, under the title Planning, Premium and Profit, drew immediate widespread attention.

Factory managers generally welcomed the plan, since it would allow them to produce for the market instead of pursuing state-set production targets that often had no relation to the actual needs of consumers.

The Soviet Academy of Sciences and other institutions were opposed, mainly because of difficulties imposed by Russia's frozen price structure. "Gradually most economists and scientists came around to the conclusion that the profit motive is suitable for a socialist system. But it was necessary to have a better order of pricing."

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viet pricing structure now is under way.

When Liberman published another article in Pravda this past Sept. 20, support for his ideas was more general.

The forces of change have received powerful support from an increasing number of Soviet newspapers and journals.

There have also, however, been powerful forces in opposition, including, according to reports, the Soviet finance ministry.

A recent speech by Finance Minister Garbuzov to the Supreme Soviet indicated that the finance ministry now is falling into line.

"The work of an enterprise should be judged not by the amount of its output," he declared, "but . . . by the extent

LONDON (AP) — Culture quiz: Which is better box office—the ballet or the Beatles?

Early this month the singing Beatles' mop-haired drummer, Ringo Starr, went into University Hospital to have his tonsils out. There were so many thousands of phone calls from worried fans that a special switchboard had to be set up.

Thursday Rudolf Nureyev, 26-year-old dancer of the Royal Ballet and long-haired darling of London's balletomanes, went into a London clinic to have his tonsils out. He slipped in at 8 a.m., said a spokesman, "to avoid any fuss like Ringo."

The operation was a surgical success, but a failure at the box office. The clinic said phone calls inquiring about Nureyev's condition stalled no more than two dozen.

Newsprint Sales Up

MONTREAL (CP) — The Newsprint Association of Canada has reported that shipments of newsprint in November were 663,274 short tons, against 611,229 short tons in the same month last year.

Total shipments since the beginning of the year were 6,678,071 short tons compared with 6,044,471 in the first 11 months of 1963. Shipments to the United States in January, February and March of 1963 were reduced by strike action against newspapers in New York and Cleveland, the report said.

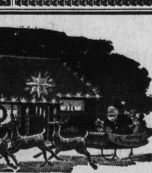

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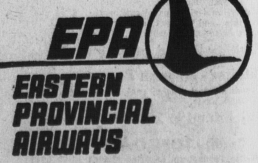


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
