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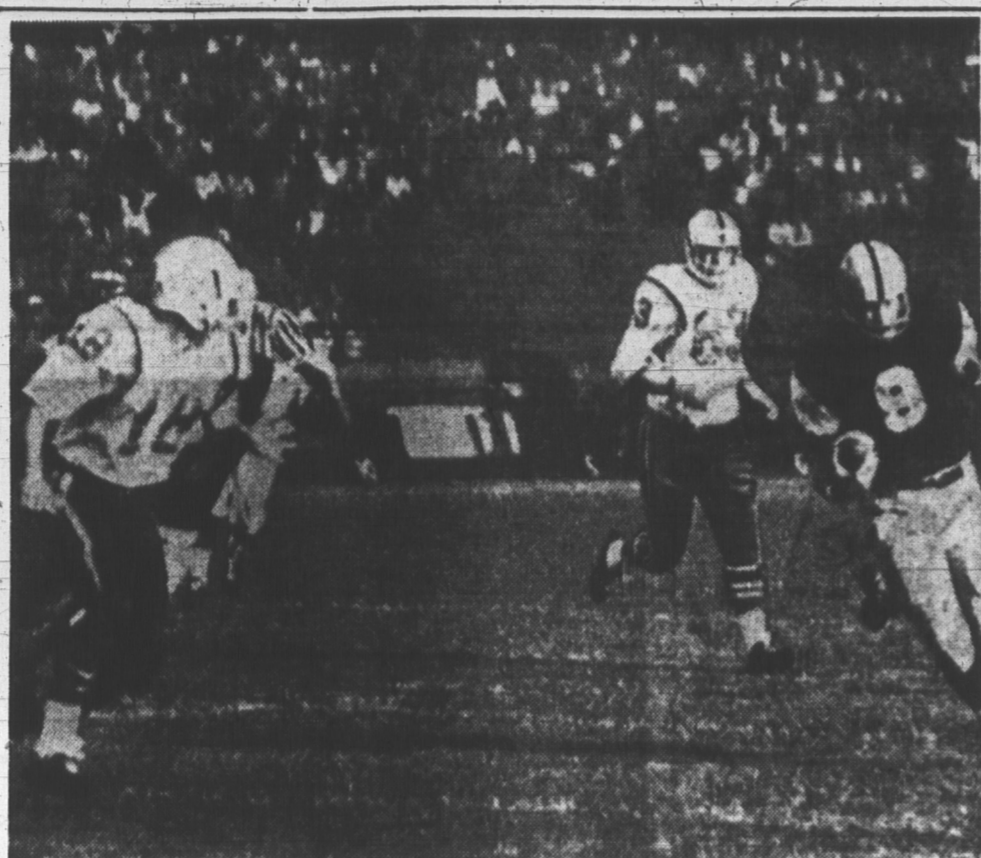
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Legion Has 300 Registered

Canadian BEG Athletes Advance On Opening Day

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)—Chun Hon Chan, a 31-year-old Montreal restaurateur, managed to lift more than three times his weight to win Canada's first medal of the eighth British Empire Games Friday, taking a third-place bronze in the bantamweight weightlifting competition.

HUNTERS' CORNER

Spidery Skins Of Ducks Dotting Skys No More

August is with us once again and already a subtle change is felt in the air and a feeling that a summer is nearing its close brings a slight twinge of nostalgia to many of us. I remember the spidery skins of black ducks streaking the skyline as they headed in from Powna Bay and Irving's Bar for fresh water in the old home lake. The duck season opened on August 10th in those days. It opened on August 20th when I was old enough to tote a shotgun.

In September, when the flocks of wildgeese came to the late at night for fresh water, I used to sit on the front veranda and watch the black vultures to the south for the flashes of the muzzie loaders and listen to the wild clamour of the departing geese. We haven't one black duck for every hundred we had in those days and our wildgeese are also down an approximate fifty per cent. Automatic "and" repeating shotguns have replaced the old muzzie loaders with their black powder loads, and sleek, 80 mile per hour autos have pushed out old dobbin and the express wagon into the discard category. With a car if one drives to a specific shooting ground and there are no ducks there it is a simple matter to drive all over a county till you find where they are located.

It has been an ideal season for hatching. An early spring with no sleet storms has given our black ducks a much needed uplift. Broods of ten and eleven black ducklings have been reported from many widely separated areas. This means that one black duck this season equals two in normal hatching years. Late spring sleet storms play havoc with young broods in the down stage. According to reports from country districts the hay mowers and the skunks are the worst enemies of wild ducks this season. Black ducks used to favour dykes and hedgerows as nesting sites. Skunks have a habit of foraging around such likely spots and they suffered heavy losses. Of late they have nested in hayfields, we'll center at that, and have suffered heavily from mowing machines. A case of from the fevring pan into the fire.

A flock of eleven wildgeese was reported by different observers this past week. It could be a scouting party on a check on how grain harvesting is progressing or even if it has started. The opening of the duck and geese season, or rather the recommended opening season on October 1st, will save a lot of wildgeese. This coming opening date an extra two weeks of stubble feeding with no hunting allowed, would have put many flocks in the 'sitting duck' category. A few good feeds on grain, without molestation from hunters, and geese feet right at home and drop in without any advance scouting for danger signs.

Our trout are in the 'doldrums' at the moment and have been for an approximate 100 weeks or longer. It requires a matchless experience and every veteran angler with patience to trick in the trade is needed to creel even a half dozen.

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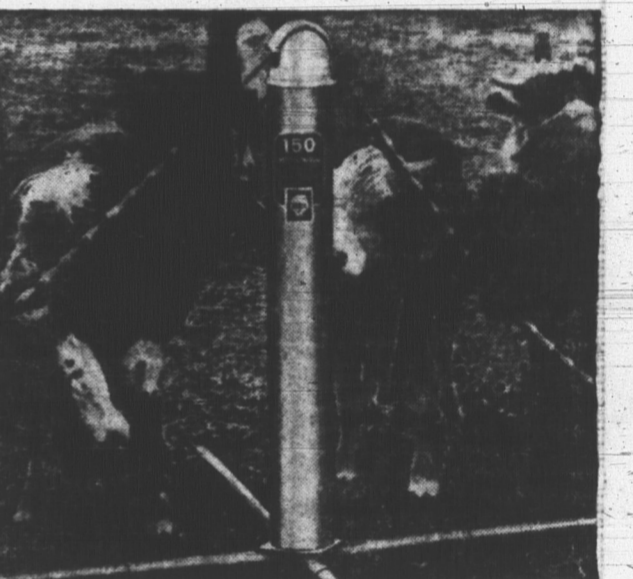
After London, he is slated to take on Germany's Karl Mollenberger in Frankfurt-Sept. 10. Then he says he may give a shot at his title to Doug Jones.
