UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.

The two following extracts from the editorials of the *Tribune* and *World* on the President's message give a good idea of its general acceptance:—

The *Tribune* says: "The most important part of the message relates to finances, banking and taxation. In this respect the message has rarely been surpassed. It is an admirable business document and deserves praise, as well for its manner and method as for the judicious recommendations which it makes. The message is strongest on foreign relations and finance, but it is not weak anywhere and it will be generally accepted by the country as a judicious, moderate and in most respects a satisfactory document."

The *World* says: "The message is a business-like paper, full of points, and in some particulars it has an aggressive individuality. It is rather the personal platform upon which his party is likely to stand. It is not likely the Republican party will be very eager to enforce or state the elaborate programme which the President lays down in regard to finances and to our foreign relations. The President speaks with a force and clearness which will command the respect of patriotic men of all parties."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.

St. Louis, Dec. 7.

Two men were killed and several injured by a railway collision near Marshall yesterday.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.

The steamer "Lake Winnipeg," from Liverpool, reports Nov. 23, had a hurricane, doing much damage. The Chief Engineer was washed overboard and lost; a fireman was thrown down the stove hole and killed. John Reynolds, another fireman, died, having drunk carbolic acid, mistaking it for vinegar.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Dec. 7.

A terrific storm prevailed along the north-west coast of Ireland last night.

DUBLIN, Dec. 7.

The "Gazette" offer £200 reward for discovery of the murderer of Mr. Rogers, solicitor's clerk, whose body was recently found near Bathdowney.

LONDON, Dec. 7.

There will be a meeting on Tuesday in Westminster Abbey to consider the proposed memorial of Dean Stanley. In accordance with the expressed desire of the Prince of Wales, Mr. Lowell, American Minister, has been invited to attend in order that the respect evinced for the memory of the late Dean throughout America, may be represented.

HANLEY, Dec. 7.

At a meeting of three thousand potters, a resolution was adopted to submit their dispute with employers to arbitration, on condition that a report on the actual state of the trade be made.

LONDON, Dec. 7.

The Grand Lodge of Master Masons, on Monday night, passed resolutions of condolence with Mrs. Garfield, moved by Lord Hinniker and seconded by Prince Leopold.

LONDON, Dec. 7.

The British Board of Trade returns for November show a decrease in the value of exports of £4,159,593, and an increase in the value of imports of £1,843,464.

The election in Londonderry County, of a successor to the Right Hon. Hugh Law, Liberal, resulted in a victory for Porter, Liberal, by 647 majority. This is considered a heavy blow to the Land League interests.

The British barque "Lord Palmerston," from St. John, N. B., for Cork, has been abandoned at sea. The crew has reached Liverpool. The Norwegian barque "Gerda" from Sheet Harbor, N. S., has arrived at Queenstown with the loss of her deckload, bulwarks and stanchions. The equipment of two schooners intended for special service on the coast of Zanzibar is being hastened in consequence of the disaster, by which Captain Browning lost his life in attempting the capture of the slave dhows. They will be ready in a week.

Admiral Bird, Commander of the "Investigator" in Sir John Ro's expedition in search of Franklin, is dead. It is believed that the police have discovered an important clue in the robbery of the body of the Earl of Crawford and Balcarre.

Among sundry flowers of rhetoric are the following: "We will," cried an inspired Democrat, "burn all our ships, and with every sail unfurled steer boldly out into the ocean of freedom!" Justice Minister Hye, in 1843, in a speech to the Vienna students, impressively declared, "The chariot of the revolution is rolling along, and gnashing its teeth as it rolls." A pan-Germanist mayor of a Rhine-land corporation rose still higher in an address to the Emperor. He said, "No Austria, no Prussia, one only Germany, such were the words the mouth of your Imperial Majesty has always had in its eye."

President Grevy is a man of such simplicity and bonhomie. His good sense and his kindness are proverbial. He was never known to turn his back on an old friend who had not succeeded in life, and as President he is accessible and courteous. His determination that his daughter should have no showy wedding, and that the money that one would cost should be sent to the Relief Bureau has been much applauded in France.
