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Femininity Very Important To Pretty Sprinting Star

OTTAWA (CP) — Slim, pretty Joan Fisher looks like the teenage models you see on television swinging those cartons of soft drinks. That kind of workout would be a soft touch for Joan—she learned how to press weights up to 100 pounds as part of the training that makes her a medal-winning sprinter. "I'm the only girl who uses the weights room at school," says the 16-year-old, Grade 12 student. "Sometimes it's kind of embarrassing—I can lift more than some of the boys." But it doesn't really bother her. She's been getting along in the man's world of track and field for about two years. She was originally encouraged to start running by her gym teacher in Grade 7, but began competing seriously only two years ago. The way Joan looks is a result of the three-hour practice sessions she puts in six days a week. "It's hard work but it's wonderful. You can eat anything you want and never put on weight." She admits that track training and competition are hard, dirty work. "Your fingernails are never clean and you sweat. Sometimes I take eight showers a day." She likes track because "it's something I can do well." But she says that girls in the same are all a bit defensive about their femininity. **WEARS EARRINGS** "Some of them spend half an hour primping before a race. Actually, putting on eye makeup must be very good for calming your nerves—you need a steady hand." After high school, she plans to train as an interpreter at schools here, and in Geneva, with an eye to working at conferences around the world or at the United Nations. Her best school subjects, naturally, are languages and last year she had an 80 average. This year it hasn't been as high and she's worried that out-of-town meets may be upsetting her schedule. Last winter, Joan went to meet in Vancouver, Toronto and Boston. In July she'll compete in Winnipeg for a place on the British Empire Games team in the five pentathlon events—200 metres, long jump, high jump, hurdles and shot put. She is used to travelling. She is a member of an air force family who lived in Cold Lake, Alta., Whitehorse, Yukon, and Toronto before coming here. Training is going to be part of her life for a long while yet. Sprinters are supposed to hit their peak about age 25, she says. "Anyway, I have to keep on doing it all my life—that's the thing about muscles, they all turn to flab if you don't use them." She doesn't intend to give up her track career for marriage, either. "I'll just have to schedule my babies in the off-season," she says jokingly.

Federal Education Program Considered On Barbiturates

OTTAWA (CP) — A federal public education program about the dangers of barbiturate and pep pills will be discussed at a fall meeting of the federal drug advisory committee, says Dr. Ross Chapman, chief of the federal food and drug directorate. He was replying to questions at a meeting of the Commons health committee. Dr. Lewis Brand (PC-Saskatoon) said at earlier committee sessions drug officers reported addiction is not serious as a problem of youth. This he said, is contrary to his experience in medical practice. R. C. Hammond, chief federal narcotics control officer, said the previous statement applied only to barbiturates and marijuana, not to barbiturates and pep pills. He agreed with Dr. Brand that there are more deaths from these pills than from morphine or narcotic addiction and greater economic loss as well.
