

Resolutions Presented At Tourist Ass'n Convention

During yesterday's business sessions of the Canadian Tourist Association convention, four resolutions were given wide discussion, with three getting approval and the fourth being sent back for revision on objection by Nova Scotia delegates headed by Earl Clark.

This resolution which dealt with the British and French cultures and their linking together and with the part played by Champlain in his early explorations. The convention had attempted to have a resolution placed before the Federal Government to negotiate with the French Government to have a replica of Champlain's ship the *Don de Dieu* constructed in that country and sailed to Canada and be the first vessel to enter the St. Lawrence estuary now under construction. The resolution was objected to on the grounds that it did not make sufficient reference to Nova Scotia and the rest of the Maritime provinces and that Champlain did not merely visit the area but was also instrumental in much of its discovery.

Looking forward to Canada's one hundred years of Confederation, it was suggested that this would afford an opportunity to honor the Canadian way of life, and therefore this country could be hosts to world wide societies. On the basis that there is only one year in which to make preparations for this event, the following resolution was passed. "That members of the Canadian Tourist Association, in convention, assembled in the City of Charlottetown site of the first negotiations in 1864 which led to the establishment of Confederation in 1867 of the Dominion of Canada, do hereby request the Government of Canada to appoint an appropriate body for this important event, the 100th birthday celebration of our nation.

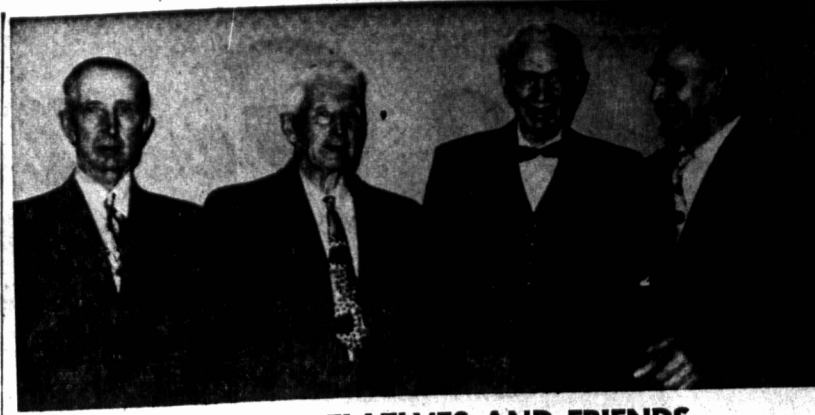
A third resolution dealing with air transportation facilities and the existing passenger facilities at the majority of Canadian airports resulted in the following resolution: "That the Canadian Tourist Association commends the Federal Department of Transport for its announced plans for expansion of airports, and urges that the provision of all types of ground facilities for use by passengers be accelerated; and that such facilities be equipped and maintained to a standard which will not only keep pace with the growth of the industry but will also reflect on the grounds that it did not make sufficient reference to Nova Scotia and the rest of the Maritime provinces and that Champlain did not merely visit the area but was also instrumental in much of its discovery.

CROSS-BORDER TRAFFIC
The fourth resolution called for steps to be taken to expedite cross-border traffic between Canada and the United States and the simplification of procedure at border points. The resolution in full reads as follows: "That the Canadian Tourist Association support efforts being made to eliminate the depositing of U.S. automobile registration documents at the border and urges the executive committee of the association to have this matter discussed with the Minister of Customs and Excise and the Dominion Bureau of Statistics as soon as possible.

Conductor Would Present Canadian Music - 37 Lands

LONDON (CP) — Ian MacMillan, 27-year-old Canadian composer and conductor, has arrived in Britain to start what he hopes will be a world tour. His aim is to present Canadian music in some 37 countries. "Canadian music is being neglected," he said in an interview. "There is an attitude in many parts of the world that Canada's music is merely a younger cousin of contemporary American music. There was some justification for this, but if one considered music by established Canadian composers, it could rank with the best of any other country. MacMillan, of Toronto and Montreal, has made tentative plans to conduct orchestras in Spain and Portugal this autumn, and some appearances in Paris are also in the offing.
