Development Committee Named For Prince County

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
ARDA consultant, Alex Sim of Ottawa and Carl Demaree of Amherst, N.S., representing the Maritime Maritime Rehabilitation Administration, spoke last night at the regular meeting of the Miscouche Regional High School development committee. They outlined the aims and methods which should be followed by such a committee and told of the part played by ARDA in assisting local organizations to put their proposals into action.

At the meeting, which began with a presentation of the first steps were taken to form a committee of reference for the government on the Prince County development committee with the selection of five members to draw up the necessary regulations for the committee. Those appointed were Rev. Robert Donald, Rev. Gerald Stoele, Ray Handman, Henry Maynard and Alex MacLaurin.

The developing theme at the meeting, which was attended by a large number of people, was expressed by Mr. Sim when he said: "There are enough people in every community to solve its own problems. No one in Charlottetown or Ottawa will do a cent more than something for Prince County — the first move must be made by you and you alone."

Explaining that Prince County and part of Queens as the designated area for this project, Mr. Sim said that a person would soon be named to represent this designated area and who would work on the scene to learn the problems first hand. The person's salary will be shared 50-50 by the federal and provincial governments, he said, and outlined the procedure for appointing a project to ARDA.

Mr. Sim warned that a complete plan should be made of the plan before it is presented. The keyword is feasibility, he said. Special mention was made of the meeting of two prices of \$50 each which are available to groups for roadside beautification this year. One prize is for work done up to July 1 and the other for work done during the entire year.

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SDU Presentation Said Creditable

A large audience was in attendance last night for the opening presentation in the Regional Drama Festival. St. Dunstan's Dramatic Society in "The Tempest" by William Shakespeare received a creditable assessment from Adjudicator Walter Massey.

Mr. Massey said he was delighted to see youth in the production and they had chosen a challenging and difficult play in that its meaning is obscure. He stated that the plays are judged on acting, directing, stage presentation, dramatic enterprise and also on achieving what the author set out to do.

He in his assessment of the play, began by stating that the lighting was atrocious but was handled as well as the facilities allowed. He criticized the makeup which he stated was insufficient in several of the characters.

for not being clear vocally. He said that the most important thing is to entertain the audience and in the last half of the presentation the players relaxed and did achieve more team work but he also felt that excitement and interpretation were lacking throughout the play.
