FOOT CRUSHED.—Frank Traill, brakeman on the Island railway, met with an accident while in the discharge of his duty yesterday afternoon that will interfere with his working for some time to come. It appears that while Traill was getting off his train at Royalty Junction he came in contact with a sleeper, and slipping, his left foot was thrown on the rail. The train was slowing up at the time. The flat part of the wheel passed over the foot across the instep from the outside of the heel to the ball of the great toe. The foot was badly crushed and the bones broken, but Dr. Corry, who is in attendance, thinks that amputation will not be necessary. Traill is at the Charlottetown Hospital.

MANY people are not aware that it is the wrapper of the tobacco which gives the color to the plug, and are therefore often deceived by a handsome outside appearance. The wrapper is a single film of leaf wrapped around the plug and is never good smoking tobacco. It is costly only because of its color. In the "Myrtle Navy" brand the chief attention is paid to the "filter," that is, the inside of the plug. It is this which determines the smoking quality of any tobacco. A tobacco can be made to look as well as the "Myrtle Navy" without much trouble or expense, but it may at the same time be a very inferior article.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Charlton's Sabbath Bill

The Case of Judge Elliott

CAUSES A LIVE Y DISCUSSION

OTTAWA, May 10.

In the House of Commons yesterday the House went into committee on Charlton's Sabbath Observance Bill. Tisdale said there was nothing in the bill which was not already contained in provincial statutes. He did not believe that parliament should interfere with matters over which the Provinces had jurisdiction, and he moved, seconded by DeKey, that the committee rise. Charlton said his bill was backed up by the moral sentiment of the country and protested against the proposal to kill it in such a cowardly fashion. He said he had made an agreement with Sir John Thompson to accept an amendment to the second clause of the bill. Sir John Thompson said that he was willing to adhere to that promise in regard to the canal section of the bill, but was unfavorable to other clauses of the measure. The Provincial Legislatures could deal best with them. For instance, there was only one Sunday newspaper published in Canada, and that was in British Columbia. That province was best able to deal with the matter. He was opposed to publishing Sunday newspapers. Bowell spoke against the bill.

After recess, Dr. Christie and Charlton again spoke in favor of it.

A vote that the Committee rise was carried by 65 to 48. This leaves the bill in committee.

Mulock resumed the debate on the motion impeaching Judge Elliott, going over all the charges against the Judge, and condemning him for the action he took during the trial of a case in regard to the voters' lists, more especially the writing of certain letters and articles to the press.

Weldon, after delivering a rebuke to Mulock for stating in the House the decision Judge Elliott was likely to give before he gave it, which was an attempt to coerce the Judge, passed on to say that the matter was not one which the House should enquire into. The case should be laid before the Government, and it was for them to appoint a Royal Commission to enquire into it, if such was necessary. The Parliament had deliberately appointed a way to try County Court Judges, therefore it was not right that it should have been dragged before the House. He made one of the ablest arguments yet made in the case, dealing calmly and judicially and convincingly with the whole subject.

Sir John Thompson supported Weldon. DeKey said that if the charges were well founded Judge Elliott had prostituted his position and the Parliament would disgrace itself if it refused to investigate them. If the Government did not intend to investigate the charges against Elliott they should not have allowed the petition to go upon record. If ministers believed in Elliott's innocence they would not allow charges against him to go upon a list. By voting down the motion for inquiry the Government and its followers would justify the prostitution of the Judiciary for partisan ends. The House divided on Lister's motion that the petition be referred to Judge Elliott for reply, which was rejected by 92 to 59.

RAILWAY RE-ARRANGEMENTS

Morell and Miscouche to be Retained.

The Summer Trains All Right.

Recent railway re-arrangements have been occupying the attention of the Island representatives during the past week. Messrs. Macdonald, McLean and the Senators have had a number of interviews with the Government, and they have succeeded in retaining Morell and Miscouche as first-class stations as heretofore. Other points are under consideration. The summer trains will be all right.

The Atlantic Fast Service.

In the Senate yesterday during a discussion respecting the proposed Atlantic fast service Premier Abbott said the matter is not in such a position at present as to afford any reasonable hope of an early solution of the difficulty. He explained the trouble with the Atlantic last year, and said it was simply because the Government would not permit Halifax to be overlooked. He said that the Government declined to renew the contract with the Allans, and for a time sent mails via New York.

A Scene in Court.

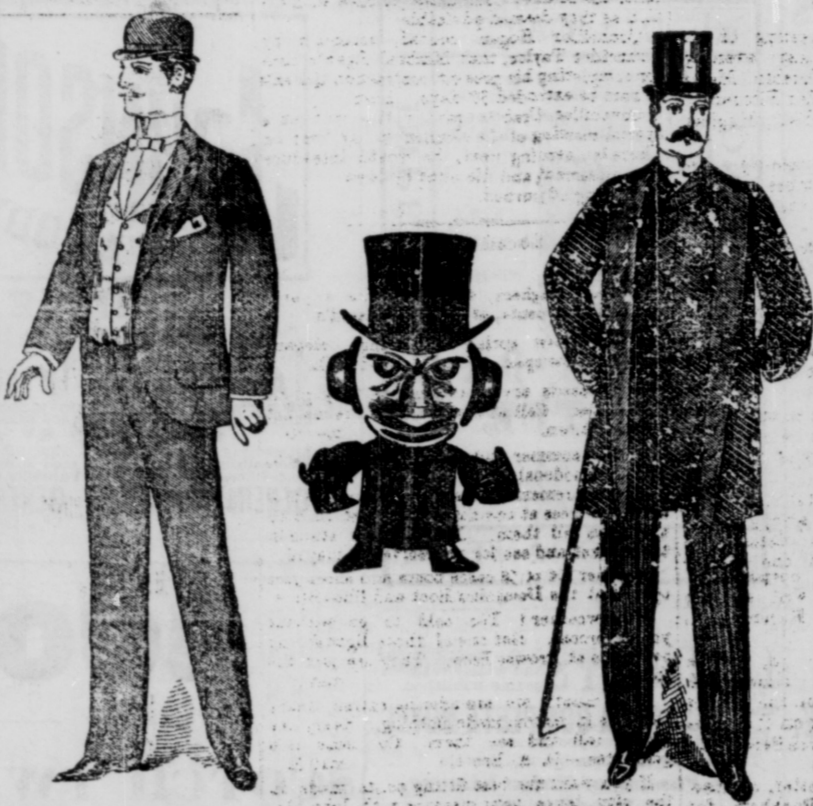
