

Mutiny on the Water Lily.

A GLOUCESTER SKIPPER HAS TROUBLE WITH HIS CREW.

On the afternoon of the 18th the fishing schooner Water Lily, of Gloucester, started from Portsmouth, N. H., on a fishing trip. The wharf was hardly cleared when Aysel McClain, one of the crew, attempted to take the wheel from Capt. John Hiltz, who was steering. The captain ordered him forward, and, when he refused, rushed him along. McClain went forward and tried to pick a row with Angus McIsaac. He was finally quieted by some other members of the crew. When the schooner had passed Fort Point Light, McClain and McIsaac suddenly advanced toward the captain, saying that they were going to run things. The captain told them that he was in command, and that he would knock the first man down that came aft. Whereupon the cook, William Donnell, caught up a hatchet and said: "If there's going to be any fighting I'm going to have a hand in it. Seeing the men advancing armed with a hatchet and wooden stove, the captain ordered them forward, and, as they still advanced, he rushed below and got his revolver. In coming up on deck his pistol, which was self-cocking, was accidentally discharged, the ball passing through his left hand, breaking the bone and one finger and severing several arteries. With the revolver in his hand, the captain told the men that he would shoot them if they did not go below. The quickly retired, the schooner was brought into harbor, anchored, a tug was signalled, and the captain brought to the city and taken to his home, and a physician called to dress his wounded hand.

A Captain's Cruelty

BRUTAL TREATMENT AT SEA OF MALAY SAILORS BY A FIEND IN HUMAN SHAPE.

There are five Malay sailors in the hospital at Brooklyn, N. Y., who are suffering excruciating tortures. They were members of the crew of the steamship Sophia Joachim, which arrived some weeks ago from Calcutta. The men, according to their statements, were treated in a shockingly brutal manner by the captain. Coming along the coast very tempestuous weather, accompanied by blinding snowstorms, was encountered. The rigging of the vessel was frozen and its decks were coated with ice. The members of the crew, which numbered 34, when they shipped at Calcutta were very insufficiently provided with clothing, and many of them were without shoes or stockings. The captain, they claim, knew this, but did not warn them of the possible severity of a winter voyage to this port. The men being without shoes found it almost impossible to work and told the captain so. He answered them with an oath, and ordered them to their posts. They refused to obey, and he caused each one to be flogged with a rope's end. They were compelled to go aloft in the frozen rigging in their bare feet. Some of them were unable to bear up, and these were starved into submission. The men's hands and feet were terribly frostbitten, and the poor wretches frequently fell down exhausted on deck. They were then treated to an application of ropes and deprived of food for twenty-four hours. Some of their limbs will have to be amputated, as gangrene has set in.

The Church Sustained.

The suit brought by Philip McGuire against the trustees of St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York, to restrain them from interfering with the burial of his father's remains, in Calvary cemetery, in which he owned a lot, was decided recently by Judge Beach, in favor of the trustees, dismissing the complaint with costs. He holds that when a man buys a burial lot he buys it subject to the rules and regulations prescribed by the religious authorities who control the cemetery. He finds that the only question at issue is whether John McGuire, at the time of his death was a member of the Roman Catholic church, and that, he holds, is a question, not for the courts, but for the church itself to decide. John McGuire died suddenly last February, while attending one of the Sunday evening meetings of the Anti-Poverty Society. He had warmly espoused the cause of Dr. McGynn in his fight against the Roman Catholic church. When an attempt was made to bury him in Calvary cemetery the trustees of St. Patrick's Cathedral, who control the cemetery, objected on the ground that he had not died in full communion with the Roman Catholic Church. The body was temporarily deposited in a vault at Greenwood cemetery, and McGuire's son, Philip McGuire, as administrator of his father's estate, brought suit against the trustees. Besides asking for an injunction restraining the trustees from interfering with the proposed burial in Calvary cemetery, he claimed \$1,000 for damages.

A Simple Preventive of Snow-Blindness.

A correspondent sends to Nature the following extract from a letter just received from his son, of the Indian Geological Survey Department, who is at present engaged by the Maharajah of Cashmere, in exploring and reporting on his Sapphire Mines: "Some time ago there was a letter in Nature describing a method of protecting the eyes from sun-glare when crossing snow, by blackening the nose and cheeks under the eyes. I tried the device the other day when I was crossing the snowfields and glaciers from Quankar and found it very successful. My Nankar and some of the other natives were much amused when I produced a piece of charcoal and proceeded to blacken my face, but they also tried it and said it relieved them very much. I don't know how the effect is produced, but it is much as when one went off the snow into a patch of moraine or rock clear of snow. The blackening seems to stop the reflected rays in some way. The natives expressed the feeling by saying it cooled the face. I found it quite possible to walk over the snow for many miles without glasses, which are a nuisance, especially on rough ground, but without the blackening I had to put them on. The sun at the great altitudes has much greater effect than in England when the ground is covered with snow."
