Gordon Murray Gives Great Performance

A young Kensington pianist, 14-year-old Gordon Murray, played spectacularly yesterday as he earned himself five firsts, including two marks of 90, one of 89, an 88 and an 86, in the Summerside section of the Prince Edward Island Music Festival.

The youngster has entered seven classes thus far and won them all.

His sister Margaret shared some of the spotlight with him, as adjudicator, David Griffiths praised her performance in singing her sacred solo and gave her a mark of 89. She also has a mark of 90 to her credit.

Mr. Griffiths was particularly pleased with the entry of the Summerside Masonic Men's Choir, stating "it is always delightful to see such a club take an interest in the music festival". He gave them a mark of 85 for "a fine performance of well blended voices".

The adjudicator also had praise for Robert Schurman, Summerside, for his vocal solo and remarked that Mr. Schurman had a fine voice with a lovely sound and a very good sense of timing. "You sang with great intelligence," he said. Mr. Schurman was given an 87.

SUMMERSIDE — A well-known Summerside man, John J. (Holman) Gallant passed away at Prince County Hospital early yesterday from a heart attack. He was taken to hospital about 3:30 a.m. after his condition became serious.

Mr. Gallant, who had been in ill health for the past two years, was 64 years of age. He was born in Mont Carmel the son of Joshua and Victoria Gallant and moved to Summerside as a youth, where he resided until his death.

He leaves to mourn his wife, the former Annie MacCue of Tignish, one daughter, Freda at home and three sons, Leonard at home, John Jr., Summerside and Lloyd, a member of the Canadian Army stationed at Camp Borden.

Also one sister, Mrs. Beatrice Cahill, Summerside and four brothers, Joshua Jr., George, Fred and Joseph, all of Summerside. Funeral will be held Saturday to St. Paul's Church for Requiem High Mass at 9 o'clock.

Fishermen in the Southern Kings area state that the catch is improved somewhat, but is holding up quite well, and no ice seems to bother them very much. Boiled lobsters there are retailing for 60 cents.

Catches were reported up in the Souris area but no price has been set yet.

Some lobsters were on retail yesterday in Charlottetown for 79 cents per pound.

None seemed to understand why only a few delegates were allowed to sit in on the cabinet meeting. "We thought this was to be a meeting of farmers with the government," many said, "why aren't we allowed in?"

When Mr. Wheatley emerged from the council chamber he said "our requests were turned down. We got a poor reception and were given no answer to our proposals."

Following Mr. Wheatley's report to the farmers assembled in the hall, many still pounded on the door of the council chamber.

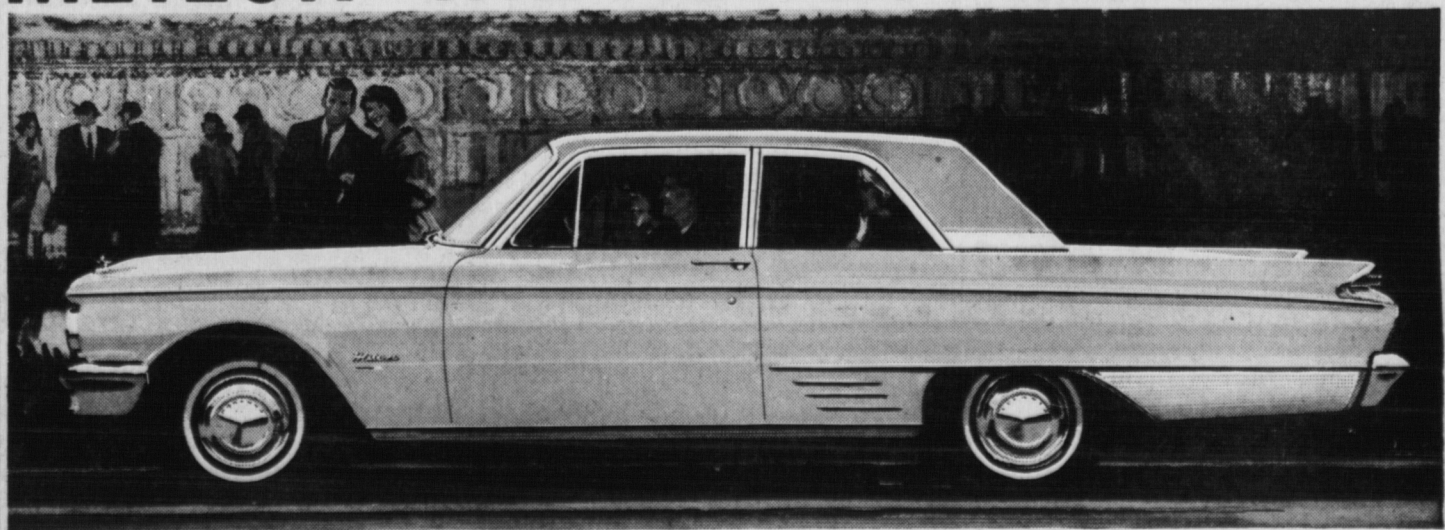
