Railway Accident.

SHUBENACADIE, N. S., Dec. 17. At Belmont Station, on the I. C. R., at 4.30 a. m. as two box cars drew out of the siding a special freight came along and ran into them, derailing eleven cars, and they ran down an embankment twenty feet. Fireman Kelly was badly hurt, being under the engine two hours and a half before he could be removed. The driver and brakeman were also slightly injured.

Another Collision.

SACKVILLE, Dec. 17. Last night, about 8.30, while a freight train was standing on the main track, at the I. C. R. Station here, the Quebec express came along and ran into the rear end of the freight train, completely demolishing van and one box car, and breaking pilot of express engine. A brakeman, who was standing on the rear of the freight train, jumped, when the express was only a few yards off, escaping uninjured. The express engine was repaired, and proceeded after a delay of only 35 minutes.

Terrible Outrage.

ATLANTA, Dec. 17. John Swilling's house was burned early yesterday morning, with Mr. Swilling, his wife and three children. Francis Sanders was arrested and confessed that he had crushed in the skulls of the sleepers, saturated the bed clothes with coal oil, applied a match and left. Citizens seized the murderer and carried him off to lynch him.

Land Troubles in Ireland.

DUBLIN, Dec. 17. Messrs. Dillon, O'Brien, Sheehy and Harris have decided to proceed against the police of Loughrea for recovery of money and documents seized here yesterday. The Government has decided to proceed against all concerned in the "Plan of Campaign" on a charge of conspiracy. It is reported that the police has been instructed to arrest campaign leaders everywhere.

Sentenced for Embezzlement.

BOSTON, Dec. 17. In the Superior Criminal Court, late this afternoon, Wm. Reid, late Treasurer of the South Boston Railroad Co., who on Saturday last pleaded guilty to embezzlement from the company, was sentenced to seven years' imprisonment in State prison.

The Death Sentence.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Dec. 17. Of nine of the youths who were sentenced here to be executed for criminally assaulting a girl, the Executive have decided to commute the sentence of three to imprisonment for life. Six others will be hanged.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17. Cote & Co., boot and shoe manufacturing company, of St. John's, Quebec, have assigned. Liabilities are \$350,000; assets \$75,000.
