

Living Costs Could Play Big Part In Next Election

OTTAWA (CP)—Few things are more popular than the economic position of the country's people. In recent months Canada's living costs have reached record high levels. And the direction prices move in coming months could play a big part in the federal election campaign expected next spring.

Living costs have been a comparatively minor issue in recent years; they remained fairly stable for three years following the inflationary period of the early Korean War days in 1950-51. The consumer price index—the prices barometer prepared by the bureau of statistics—took a big jump during May. In June it surpassed the previous record high of December, 1951, and last week the bureau reported it had moved to a new high mark during July.

and the question of inflation has joined other issues in that country's presidential election campaign. Federal officials here shy away from predicting the future course of consumer costs. Normally, the fall food harvest and more abundant food supplies bring price drops. Some experts say these factors are unlikely to be so strong this fall as in previous years. Labor unions also have taken notice of the rising costs and officials of the Canadian Labor Congress have said there is new interest among member unions in getting cost-of-living wage-escalator clauses written into new labor contracts. That type of contract was fairly widespread during the Korean War inflation. When prices leveled off and even dropped a bit many unions succeeded in getting the so-called cost-of-living "bonus" embodied in regular wage rates.

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Internal Tibet Administration Handed Over To Nationalists

KATMANDU, Nepal (Reuters)—The Chinese Communists have handed over the internal administration of Tibet to Tibetan nationalists, reports reaching here Wednesday said. Nepalese traders arriving from the Tibetan capital of Lhasa said the move was made following a "mass revolt" led by Tibetan monks in July. The uprising, which some earlier reports described as a "full-scale war," drove Communist troops from many Tibetan areas. It climaxed a long period of unrest which followed the occupation of Tibet by Chinese Communist troops in 1950. In 1951, possibly to tone down resentment against Chinese authority, Communist China agreed to recognize the dala lama as a spiritual and temporal ruler. Tibet, nevertheless, remained virtually a Chinese province. PROTESTED HIGH TAXES But Tibetans still resented roads into the dala lama's authority and protested against high taxes imposed by the Chinese. Tibetans also bridled at the "compulsory indoctrination" of youths and the requisition of grain by the Chinese army. Last fall, when the dala lama returned to Lhasa after a visit to Peiping, 20,000 Tibetan delegates were reported to have demanded the withdrawal of Chinese troops. Meanwhile, Tibetan soldiers were reported to have strongly resisted Chinese efforts to disband

EXPLORER DIES
MOSCOW (AP)—Dr. Otto Yulievich Schmidt, 64, chief of the Soviet northern sea route administration in the 1930s, died Friday after a long illness. A noted explorer, he commanded the first expedition ever to sail in a single season through the northeast Passage from the North Atlantic to the Pacific. The 1932 voyage paved the way for regular shipping through the cold seas north of Europe and Asia. the small Tibetan regular army on the grounds of economy.
