In Kinkora recently the districts of Shamrock, Kinkora and Middleton were represented on a panel, which was the result of study groups on the liturgical changes in the church. This was the first in a series of panels which are to be held on the same subject.

The panel chaired by Mrs. Clair Duffy and made up of the following members: Mrs. Francis Lawless, Mrs. Bert Hamill, Mrs. Vernon McCarville, Mrs. Leonard Roberts, Mrs. Frank McDougall and Sister Clare Theresa, CSM, discussed the concepts of "The Priesthood of the Faithful" and "Active Participation" in the liturgy. The reasons for liturgical renewal were outlined and the responsibilities and privileges of the Christian were brought into focus. It was pointed out that the

church is trying to find a more natural way for 20th century man to appreciate fully his great privilege of worshipping God. The fact that this worship may best be carried out through man's intelligent participation in the liturgy was brought out forcibly.

As an illustration of what might be involved in active participation the audience, under the direction of Sister Mary Jugé, CSM, took part in a singing period of appropriate liturgical hymns. Rev. H.J. Croken expressed his enthusiastic approval and gratitude to the panel for the presentation and this enthusiasm was seconded by all present.

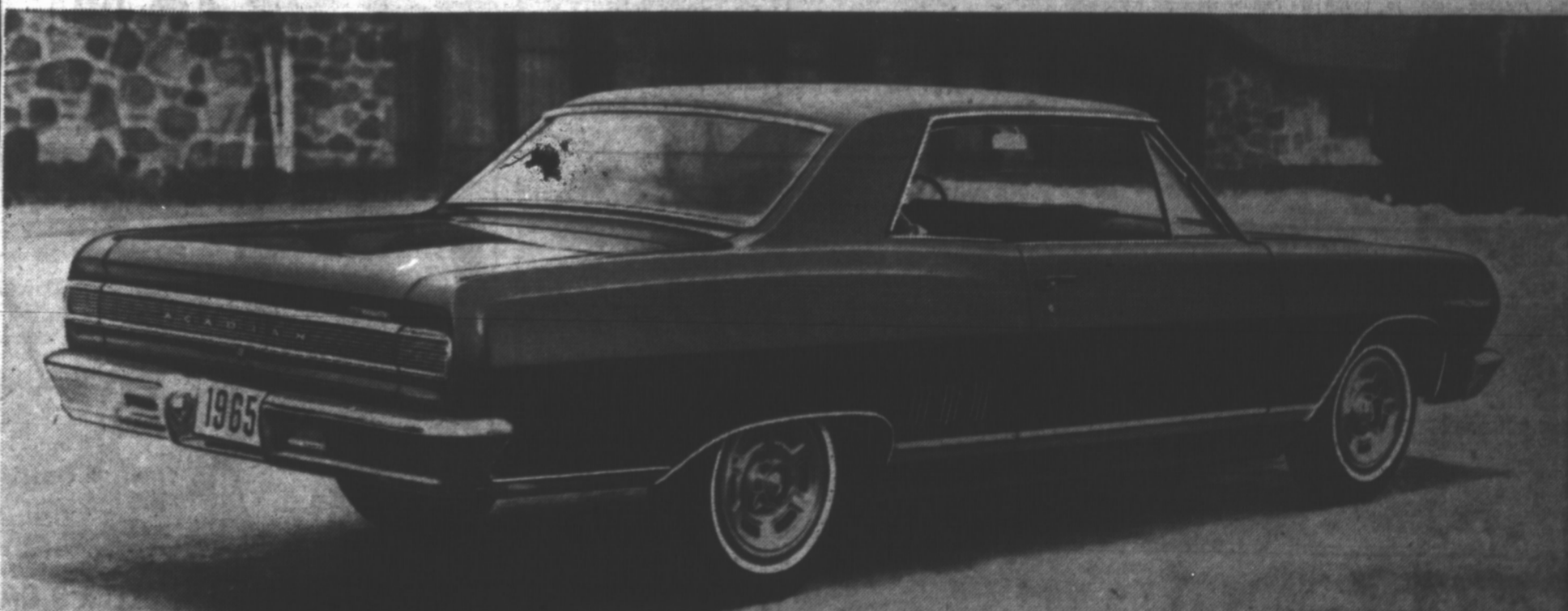
