Band Pianist Says "Twist" Definition Gives Insight

Dear Mary Haworth: I must tell you how much I enjoyed your recently published definition of the current dance sensation, the Twist.

I have been playing music all my life and have done many years of dance band piano. I have seen the Charlene, the Black Bottom, etc., but the Twist is something deeper, far more fascinating and, above all, very important.

Therefore, when I read your statement, "The Twist, I would say, is a kind of free form dance version of the mating call"—it struck me as the best, most logical definition that I have encountered to date. It has humor, too; but it is a deeply psychological insight into the nature (or message) of the dance. Mankind cannot be dizzied.
