Site Selected For Seniors' Housing In Souris Announced

A site has been chosen in Souris for the first government-built senior citizens housing unit. Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge said yesterday.

On the two-acre site on Chapel Street, which was donated for the project, the housing corporation plans to erect a building that will house four self-contained apartment units.

Mr. Wedge met last night with corporation directors C.R. McQuaid and Keith Pickard to complete an application which will be sent to Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, who will loan 90 per cent of the construction cost under the limited dividend section of the National Housing Act. The provincial government puts up the additional 10 per cent of the cost.

The application will contain plot plans and specifications and show that there is a need for such housing in the area.

"This is a pilot project," said Mr. Wedge, "and we are starting out with four units. If we feel there is a need for more housing of this type in the area we will make further application for funds."

The win narrowed Los Angeles Dodgers lead in the National League to four games over the second-place Giants.

Mays opened with homer No. 33 in the first inning off starter and fellow Dallas Green and the major league's home run leader followed by No. 34 in the second off southpaw Billy Smith, both times with a mate on base.

Wally singled in the fourth, fifth and eighth, the second game knocking in his 10th run of the year.

When Douglas, after fighting off two match points, finally hit the ball over the base line for the final point, the boisterous crowd rushed onto the court and carried Omsa off on their shoulders.

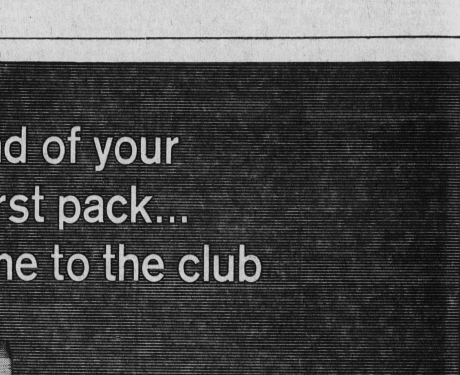

Port Closing Puts Squeeze On Katanga

ELISABETHVILLE, (AP) — The Katanga provincial government expressed relief Monday that the Nations closing of Elisabethville Airport is the first step in international pressure to end the province's secession from the rest of the Congo.

Under an order issued by Rev. UN, Sunday, only UN planes can land at the airport.

Sabena, the Belgian airline with major operations in this mineral-rich province, said the order was more far-reaching. Sabena said it had been notified by UN authorities here its planes were barred from landing anywhere in Katanga.

A UN spokesman said the airport was closed at the request of the Congolese government of the Congo in Leopoldville.
