A new type of summer service for those who like to eat out is being inaugurated today at Robson's Restaurant (formerly Coyle's) with the institution of curb service. The front of the building has been renovated so that large casement type windows open and orders can be served direct to the outside waitresses.

A large menu will be displayed on the outside of the building and people wishing to eat in their cars may order anything on the menu. When cars drive in, waitresses will approach and take orders which they will promptly serve at the car.

ceeded to Royal Junction, Milton and Winsloe Road. He blew the whistle at Winsloe Road and continued to blow through to Winsloe Station Crossing.

He testified that he saw the vehicle approaching from the Summerside direction on the left hand side and was going between 45 and 50 miles an hour in his estimation.

Witness said it was not evident to him until he was right on the crossing that the vehicle was going to crash into the train. He stated he immediately applied the brakes and that the engines came to a stop four car lengths west of the crossing.

He got out of the engine and saw one body on the road on the driver's side of the truck lying face down under the left hand door. The other fellow was sitting upright in the truck.

There the Red Cross set up headquarters and the youngsters were fed.

An unknown number of old persons were taken to hospital suffering from shock. It was believed injuries were few among those who escaped.

Burned fiercely
The 75-year-old building, at Atwater Avenue and Delisle Street in south-central Montreal, burned fiercely. Huge clouds of smoke rolled over the mid-town section and thousands of pedestrians and motorists swarmed to the scene. The fire broke out about noon.
