### EDUCATIONAL PROBLEMS DISCUSSED AT HOME & SCHOOL ASS'N MEETING

The shortage of qualified teaching personnel and the inadequacy of classroom space were two of the greatest problems facing the Home and School Association, pointed out by Mr. H. H. Simpson, of Sydney, N. S., vice president of the National Home and School Association in addressing the semi-annual meeting of the Provincial Association held at Prince of Wales College last night.

There was a very good attendance at the meeting which was presided over by the Provincial President, Mrs. J. Gordon MacDonald. Among those present on the platform was the Minister of Education, Hon. Kier Clark who expressed his thanks to the speaker in a few remarks at the close of the meeting.

Introducing the speaker was Mr. Kenneth Parker, superintendent of schools for the City of Charlottetown. Mr. Parker made reference to the fact that Mr. Simpson was a native son of Prince Edward Island who although a businessman had given voluntarily of his time in the interests of H & S until he has been recognized as personifying what Home and School stands for in Canada.

Previous to the meeting proper, the audience was delighted with two beautiful choral numbers by some of the junior girls from Rochford Square School. Their renditions of "The Teddy Bear's Picnic" and "The Wedding of Jack and Jill" were well received and gave evidence of patient and efficient training on the part of their instructresses.

"We hear a great deal about the high cost of education these days," said Mr. Simpson who went on to point out that in United Kingdom, \$465 is spent for the proving and solving of crime to every dollar spent on education. Quoting from President Eisenhower, he said, "the cost of one modern bomber would be enough for the erection of 30 city schools."

### SENSE OF VALUES

"Since it has been shown that our liquor bill and crime bill are substantially higher than the cost of providing education for our children, we need to re-examine our sense of values in so far as our children's education is concerned," said the speaker.

Mr. Simpson stated that in every Province we have schools that are now staffed by a teacher or by teachers who are below the minimum standard required within that particular province. He went on to show that in many schools there is an overcrowding so that pupils are required to attend either in the morning or the afternoon.

In making reference to the role played by the parent in the Home and School Association, he compared it to a "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" situation. In one instance he said "they feel it is their duty to make recommendations for improvements but on the other hand find themselves in the all important position of taxpayers."

Mr. Simpson pointed out however that as a result of two important surveys made in the Province of Nova Scotia and in the whole of Canada, when the question was asked parents, "Are you willing to pay higher taxes, if your children are to be better educationally provided for?" the response in the first instance was 82% and in the second, 79% in the affirmative.

"The Home and School Association as a group of interested and dedicated people who have a goal and ambition to see that every child in this country shall get the best possible education that can be provided, can do much to show those in authority what the needs existing in our educational system are."

### Cash Stolen From Welfare Bureau

The Catholic Social Welfare Bureau on the corner of Pownall and Grafton Streets was broken into on Thursday night and \$100. in cash carried off by the thief of thieves. Everything was normal on the premises at closing time, and the theft was not discovered until the Sisters in charge opened the Bureau at 8:30 yesterday morning.

Entry was gained by removing the screws on one side of the storm window and bending it back to permit entry through an inner window, which the thief broke.

The stolen money, which had been placed in different small receptacles, was earmarked for specific charitable purposes in which the Sisters are engaged.

City Police are investigating the break. The Catholic Social Welfare Bureau, incorporated in 1948, exists solely for the needy, distressed, and unfortunate of the Charlottetown area. Since its formation it has distributed tons of fuel and clothing placed dozens of orphans in foster homes, and provided at home nursing care for hundreds of needy patients. It exists on voluntary contributions from the public, and the demands on the Bureau are always heavy.

### The Week at S. D. U.

Another football season has gone down into history and it did two years ago, S.D.U. has won both the Maritime Intercollegiate championship and the McCurdy cup. On losing only two of their seven games, the Saints came through in splendid fashion, amassing thirty-one points while having only fourteen scored against them. At 2:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 19, as the team trotted out on the field and saw the massive Saint John Mariners out there waiting for them, each of them must have thought to himself, "This is going to be the toughest game I've ever played," and so, spurred on by the thought of a victory which at that time seemed impossible to accomplish, this great team of ours vowed to put everything they had into the game.

After five minutes of play the cheering fans knew that S.D.U. had the better team and when Lloyd Gaudet plunged through the Mariners and crossed the line for the first try of the game, victory was almost certain. The first half ended with the score three to nothing. The second half was a replica of the first with the Mariners being unable to get into the Saints' territory. About halfway through the second half, Aquinas Ryan playing, as was his team-mate Lloyd Gaudet, his last football game at S.D.U., plunged over the line for the second try of the game. Reardon took the kick and made good, raising the score to eight to nothing in favour of S.D.U. Then in the dying moments of the game "Big Louie" MacDonald made a beautiful field goal from about fifteen yards out to level the scoring. Certainly, we cannot change over to Canadian football in one year. One rumor on the campus has it that there will be no senior football next year, and that all football will be conducted in the intramural series, in which Canadian football will be played. This seems to be a plausible solution in that it will introduce the students to Canadian football, so that in 1956 we will again have first team football, but rugby abandoned in favour of the more modern game.

### ISLAND SITUATION

Hon. Mr. Clark in thanking the speaker noted that there were no schools of Prince Edward Island that were without the services of a teacher this year. He did admit that a good number of these teachers were permit teachers. To clarify another point Mr. Clark said that the apparent reduction in the number of students taking Normal training at Prince of Wales College this year is due to the fact that grade XII was introduced into the school curriculum and that many students who would normally be obliged to take grade XII in P.W.C. found it more convenient to carry out this work in the community of their own choice.
