

2 Government Supporters Nominated For 5th Queens

Two Government members, Hon. B. Earle MacDonald and Hon. Alex MacIsaac were unanimously nominated to represent the Liberal party in the 5th district of Queens at a largely attended meeting held at the Community Centre last evening.

Mr. MacDonald's nomination was moved by Elmer Blanchard and seconded by W.R. LePage. Mr. MacIsaac's nomination was moved by E.D. Reid and seconded by Daniel O'Rourke.

Mr. MacDonald came into the legislature in 1955 and in 1958 was asked by the Premier to assume the dual portfolio of Welfare and Labour.

Mr. MacDonald said however that he was not going to conduct his campaign on the basis of what Ottawa had done. He said the Liberal Government of P.E. more money in the 5th district island had done more and spent of Queens than any other previous government.

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Teaching Success Depends On Parents

Teaching success to a great extent depends on the degree of co-operation given by parents, K.A. Parker superintendent of the Charlottetown school system said yesterday.

In a brief address made during the special closing exercises for the junior grades of Queen Square School held in the auditorium of Birchwood High, Mr. Parker noted that children spent only 25 hours of each week under supervised instruction in the schoolroom.

In view of this factor teachers could accomplish little unless the parents of the pupils under their care were making a full-time job of preparing their offspring to participate in the instruction the school has to offer.

Without such constant co-operation the teachers job was "doomed to incompletion," he said. Other speakers included J. T. Plaice, president of the QSS Home and School Association, and Judge C. St. Clair Trator, who acted as chairman for the exercises.

Nuclear Arms In Iraq Army

BAGHDAD, Iraq. (Reuters)—Iraq's army has been completely re-equipped with new weapons, including nuclear arms, the president of the People's Court said Thursday.

Col. Fadhel Abbas Mahdawi, the court president and a cousin of Premier Karim Kassem, said that the new equipment includes radar and Russian-built jet planes as well as other "secret arms" procured since the overthrow of the monarchy last July.

In London, officials expressed surprise and officialism at the statement. A Foreign Office spokesman said: "We have no confirmation of this report."

Indian Bill Is Approved

OTTAWA (CP) — The Senate resources committee Thursday gave quick consideration and approval to a bill confirming an agreement on Indian reservation lands between Nova Scotia and the federal government.

The bill, which goes back to the Senate for third reading, formally transfers the authority to sell such lands surrendered by Indians from the provincial to the federal government.

Nova Scotia, with a Micmac Indian population of 3,435, has 40 small reserves covering a total of 19,492 acres. Similar agreements have been made between the federal government and Ontario, British Columbia and New Brunswick. No agreements have been made with Quebec and Prince Edward Island. None was necessary between the federal government and the three Prairie provinces, where there was no provincial Crown land.
