**Shipments By
Rail In April**

1518 carloads of various com-
modities were forwarded from
Borden to Cape Tormentine during
the month of April, 1957, a de-
crease from last year's compar-
able figure, of 1696 the April re-
port of the Office of the Super-
intendent, C.N.R., Charlottetown,
discloses. Potatoes accounted for
1077 of the total carloads, a de-
crease from the April, 1956 figure
of 1234. Livestock also showed a
decrease from last year's figure
of 102 to 94, as did turnips, 75
carloads being shipped during the
past April as compared to 134 in
April, 1956.

Eggs, however, increased to
6 carloads during the period, 2
above last April's figure but
meats decreased 4 carloads to 20
in April, 1957.
Figures for other goods shipped
in substantial quantities dur-
ing the past April, with the April
1956 figure appearing in brackets,
are: butter and cheese, 5 (8);
fish, 1 (0); hides, 1 (2); less car-
loads, 78 (60); oats, 1 (0); miscel-
laneous, 132 (68); cannery goods,
7 (9); vegetables, 2 (3).

Be Seaway First**

BRANTFORD, Ont. (CP)—The
royal yacht bearing Queen Eliza-
beth and the Duke of Edinburgh
may be among the first vessels
using the St. Lawrence Seaway
when it is opened in 1959, Prime
Minister St. Laurent suggested
Tuesday.
He referred to planned seaway
ceremonies at an open-air rally in
this southwestern Ontario city.
"Informing his audience that he
knew the Queen "will be very
happy" to attend the opening, he
added:
"And I hope that she and the
duke will be among the first per-
sons using the seaway aboard the
royal yacht."
No date has yet been set for the
seaway opening, though there have
been reports it may take place in
May or June 1959.
