LATEST NEWS FROM CHINA

Still Nothing Definite

REPORTED MINISTERS ARE ALIVE AND IN SAFETY.

Leader of the Boxers Said to Have Been Killed.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]
THE FIRST APPEAL.

LONDON, July 28.—It turns out that as early as July 12, an appeal from the Emperor of China to Queen Victoria for mediation, dated July 3, was handed to Lord Salisbury, and it is understood that the other powers were not communicated with until July 20.

CONFLICTING REPORTS.

LONDON, July 28.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Express asserts that three versions of Sir Claude Macdonald's letter, of July 6, are current there and that it is believed that all three originated from Chinese sources. He adds, however, that Li Hung Chang says that the Legation party ought to reach Tien Tsin on Sunday.

MINISTERS STILL ALIVE.

LONDON, July 28.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says trustworthy information which reached me to-day (Friday) convinces me that all the ministers except Baron von Kappeler, are still alive. Some of the European survivors are leaving Peking.

MORE RUMORS.

LONDON, July 28.—The Post's correspondent at Chefoo, wiring on Wednesday says: "There is a rumor here that Prince Ching rescued the legation and conveyed them to a place of safety."

Eighteen missionaries have been massacred at Tung Cha, where the churches have been burned.

THE KAISER'S ORDER.

BERLIN, July 28.—The Lokal Anzeiger says that the Emperor, addressing the troops at Bremerhaven before they sailed for China, yesterday, said that the expedition was to avenge an outrage committed against the sanctity of the ambassadors and an unprecedented breach of the right of hospitality. "If you close with the enemy" said the Emperor, "you know no quarter will be given and no prisoners taken. Use your weapons so that for a thousand years no Chinaman will dare to hear a German,—and pave the way for civilization now and evermore."

IMPORTANT—IF TRUE.

LONDON, July 28.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Express says: "It is reported here that a large section of Boxers have revolted against Prince Tuan alleging that he is making tools of them for his own ends. A desperate conflict took place outside Peking on Sunday. Prince Tuan personally led his followers, two of his generals having deserted him. The battle lasted several hours and Prince Tuan was defeated and killed."

Rain in India.

LONDON, July 26.—The governor of Bombay presidency, Lord Northcote, of Exeter, reports a general rainfall, "sufficient for agricultural purposes," sufficient for agricultural purposes. He says that 2 1/2 inches of rain had fallen since yesterday in Godhra and Panch Manhals, an inch in several parts of Ahmedabad, over half an inch in parts of Kara and sufficient in the portions of Baroda adjoining Surat.

In the remaining part of Baroda no rain has fallen, and an extensive failure of crops is inevitable, unless there is immediate relief. In Okhamandal the rainfall has been insufficient, and cultivation is at a standstill in almost the entire province of Kathlawar, where cattle are dying of starvation and scarcity of water.

There have been good rains in Bombay, Khandeish and the Deccan where prospects are greatly improved. The death rate in Gujarat has decreased nearly half as compared with that of May.

War in the Air.

SHANGHAI, July 27.—Trade in Shanghai is so paralyzed that the customs revenue will not suffice to secure the payment of the next installment of the foreign loan. Meanwhile active preparations in the Yang Tse region for war in progress, not for war against the rebels but against foreign powers. Junk loads of Chinese soldiers and Boxers disguised as coolies, are arriving here daily. The arsenal is full of arms and supplies are constantly coming in. The Nankin and Wu Chang garrisons are being constantly reinforced, and the viceroys admit that they cannot much longer withstand the pressure brought to bear by Sheng and Li Hung Chang upon them to join forces with Prince Tuan. It is hoped that the arrival of Admiral Seymour here may stiffen the backs of the pro-foreign viceroys, and restore the security of the port.

The Washington View.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 27.—Secretary of State John Hay left Cleveland this forenoon for Canton to confer with President McKinley on the Chinese situation. He will leave Canton this evening for Washington. Late last night Secretary Hay said:—

"The State department is acting on the supposition that it has heard nothing from Mr. Conger, since June 12. China is at peace with the world, so far as the official facts are concerned."

"The situation is one of terrible uncertainty and nothing that has come or purported to have come from our minister at Peking has lessened the danger or uncertainty. No one can say what may or may not be the outcome."

Things Upside Down in China.

China is the land where everything is upside down. Thus in Canton the women act as sailors and boatmen, while the men are employed as chambermaids, laundresses and seamstresses. In salutation the Chinaman shakes his own hand instead of that of his visitor. As a mark of respect he puts his hat on instead of taking it off. Their signboards are perpendicular instead of horizontal. In reading Chinese print it is necessary to begin at the right hand side at the bottom and read to the left and up.—St. Louis Republic.

Another Menace.

HONG KONG, July 27.—The signs of menacing activity on the part of the secret society known as the "Triads" are causing alarm. The Boxers are believed to be an offshoot of the Triads, whose ramifications are widespread throughout the southern provinces of China. The organization is distinctly anti-foreign and anti-Manchu and numbers of Canton troops are enrolled in its ranks.

Balfour's Remark

LONDON, July 27.—In connection with the scare created by the immense quantities of steam coal leaving Great Britain for France, admitted for the use of the French navy, A. J. Balfour, first lord of the treasury, significantly pointed out in the House today that the bill before Parliament to prevent the exportation of war munitions applied to coal as well as to other military stores.

Japanese Victory.

SHANGHAI, July 27.—It is reported that the Japanese landed 1,500 troops at Sha-Hai-Kwan on July 22, and gained a victory, the Chinese retreating after a feeble resistance.

Who Are Retiring in Disorder.

GENERAL HUNTER HAS OCCUPIED FOURIERBERG.

Lord Methuen's Column Moving on Potcheestroom.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

LONDON, July 28.—The War Office has the following from Lord Roberts:

General French and Hutton continued their pursuit on July 25th. The former crossed Cliphant's River, and from the high ground on the east bank, he could see Middleburg and the enemy retreating in great disorder. The main road north was blocked for several miles with horsemen and wagons. The enemy's rear was then seven miles north.

The mounted force was still west of the river, night was closing in, the rain was falling in torrents and so it was impossible to follow.

The night was terrible. In addition to rain, a strong east wind made the bivouac most uncomfortable. One officer, I regret to say, died of the exposure, and the mortality among the mules and oxen was great.

The men made light of the hardships, and were in famous spirits when I saw them yesterday.

Hunter has occupied Fourierberg, and so far as I know, did not suffer loss. He found Mrs. Steyn, wife of the ex-president and several of our men whom Dewet had captured at different times, and whom he was unable to send to Madsodorp.

The enemy in Bethlehem hills are now close in upon Beantland, which is closed to them.

Harrismith is the only line open, and it will not be easy for them to reach there with the guns and wagons.

General Broadwood is still watching Christian Dewet who has taken up a position in the high hills near Reitzburg, seven miles south of the Vaal.

"P. P. Dewet, a younger brother of Christian, surrendered at Kroonstadt yesterday."

General Barren reports from Krugersdorp that he has reconnoitred the railway to Bauxo station, where the train was wrecked July 19, and has been able to replenish his supplies.

Lord Methuen's column, which reached Krugersdorp on the Potcheestroom railway is now moving on to Potcheestroom.

General Buller reports that the railway was opened to Heidelberg yesterday, giving through communication to Natal.

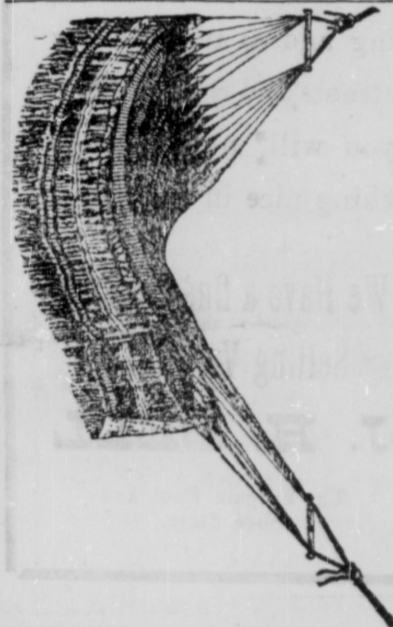
