ARBOR DAY.—The planting of shade trees is on the increase. This year quite a number have been put down, and, although the season is advanced, some are still being planted. We are glad to see clergymen and teachers taking this important matter in hand. Every good tree planted is so much added to the beauty and value of our homes.

THE MOTION DISMISSED.—In the suit for libel of the Toronto Mail against the Empire, judgment was given on Saturday, dismissing the motion made at the last session of the assize court by the solicitors for the prosecution that the defendants plea of justification be struck out. The Empire was charged by the Mail with libel in accusing them of treason and traitorous conspiracies, etc.

JAPAN.—We have received from Rev. Benj. Chappell, now of Tokyo, Japan, a neatly printed copy of the Tokyo, Ei-wa Gakko Calendar, 1890. It contains illustrations of the Goucher Hall, the Philander Smith Biblical Institute and grounds, together with an historical statement and general regulations of the institutions. In the list of faculty we find a number of Canadians, amongst whom are Prof. J. W. Wadman and Rev. Benj. Chappelle, of P. E. Island. The names of the Japanese teachers are most difficult to pronounce, but the number is legion. It seems that education in the far East is now receiving the greatest attention, and the christianizing of Japan in the very near future is assured.

SELLING DECAYED BUTTER.—Yesterday a little girl was sent to the market for some butter by her mother. She made the purchase from a country woman, but when she brought the butter home her mother was not long in making the discovery that it was not so sound as it had once been—that the smell from it was not at all what it should be. She at once sent the child back with the butter, with instructions to have her money returned, but before the little one reached the market the woman had taken her departure. Her husband, however, was interviewed, but he declined to refund the money claiming that there was nothing wrong with the butter—that he had used some of it himself not long before. This business of selling decayed butter should be put a stop to at once.

POLICE COURT.—This morning Henry McEwen, charged with the larceny of \$40 from Captain Peter DeCoste, of the schooner Soudan, confessed, and was given twelve months imprisonment. It appears that McEwen entered the cabin of the schooner which is loading cattle for St. Johns, Nfld., at Queen's wharf, yesterday afternoon, while the captain was busy attending to the shipping of the cattle, and appropriated a cash box therefrom containing the amount above stated. After taking out the money McEwen threw the box over the wharf. The box was missed some time later, and the fact was made known to Marshal Cameron, who traced the theft to McEwen, and had him arrested at the Lyceum after the performance last night. This morning, seeing that the Marshal had worked up a strong case against him, he confessed his guilt, and was disposed of in the manner above stated. This is the first conviction by the Magistrate under the amended Criminal Law. John Newson was fined \$5 for allowing a nuisance in the shape of a pile of manure to exist near the residence of Mr. Charles Higgins; and one drunk was disposed of for \$2 or 3 days.

The Kemmler Case Again.

WASHINGTON, May 20. The application for a writ of error in the case of Kemmler was heard in the Supreme Court of the United States to-day. Mr. Shennan, counsel for Kemmler, based his argument on the fourteenth amendment to the constitution, which provides that no state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges and immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty or property, without due process of law, and on the eighty-eighth amendment, which provides that cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted, the Court, without rendering a decision, adjourned until Friday.

Liquor-Selling in Boston.

BOSTON, May 20. Three weeks ago the Police Commissioners notified the liquor dealers of Boston that after 20 days the fifth condition of the licenses which prohibits the sale of intoxicating liquors over public bars would be enforced. The 20 days notice expired to-day. Liquor is being quite generally served on tables instead of over bars. Chairman Whiting, of the Police Commissioners, says they will strictly enforce the law, but are in doubt as to its application in particular cases. A few test cases will be taken to the courts, and only enough arrests to determine the application of the law are expected.

His Skull Fractured.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 20. Albert Johnson, a Swedish sailor, while in the horrors jumped out of a three story window this afternoon falling about 50 feet. He was taken to the hospital and it was found that the base of his skull was fractured. It that be the case he will die.

The Behring Sea Fisheries.

WASHINGTON, May 20. The Behring Sea fisheries was considered at to-day's Cabinet meeting. It was decided, it is understood, to advert the policy of last season which is practically the same as the position taken by the last and previous administrations.

Silk Mills Closed.

ACBURN, N. Y., May 20. The Logan Silk Mills were closed to-night by the Sheriff on judgments aggregating \$17,000. About 500 hands are thrown out of employment. The failure is attributed to the unsettled condition of the silk market due to tariff legislation.

Committed For Trial.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 20. Daniel Robertson has been committed for trial at Westville, for murdering William Robertson. The murderer is 30 years of age. Both the murderer and his victim were to have been married within a week. Both were drunk.

Weights, Measures and Gas Report, 1889.

Senator Howlan has forwarded to the Collector of Inland Revenue the above report, from which we are permitted to extract the following:—Weights and Measures comprise 23 inspection districts, in which last year (ending June 30, 1889,) 219,027 scales, weights and measures have been tested, of which number only 1,533 have been rejected and condemned, quite a small percentage. The collections for the year amounted to \$36,040.91, against \$37,885.39 in 1888, being a decrease of \$1,444.48; while the expenses for 1889 were \$67,310.14, against \$67,470.68 for 1888, an increase of \$160.54. So that the money loss appears to be for 1889, \$1,605.02. Still this service approves itself to Parliament and the country.

Gas inspection districts number 25 divisions and 40 places therein, while five other towns have asked for the service. There have been 8623 metres tested, of which quantity 1535 were condemned and finally rejected, a rather large percentage. The collections amounted to \$7922.75, against \$6946.65 for 1888, giving an increase this year of \$976.10, while the expenses, \$18,538.96 for 1889, against \$20,894.98 for 1888 show a decrease of \$2358.02; a gain both ways. The report says a decided improvement has taken place in the gas illuminating power all over the Dominion, save at Ottawa and Corawil. Tests for purity, sulphur, etc., are regularly and frequently made in nearly all the places in the districts. We comment this report to students of parliamentary reports and blue books.
